Winter Uniform Update

A reminder about the correct wearing of James Hargest College uniform for the winter season.

- Kilts or A-line skirts may be worn throughout the year at both the Junior and Senior Campus. Skirts must be of a reasonable length, neither very short nor longer than mid-calf. Long pants are available as an alternative for the winter skirt/kilt.
- Undergarments may be a plain white t-shirt, merino or polyprop worn under the white shirt/ blouse/ for extra warmth (should not be visible below blouse/shirt hems or sleeves). Black or white may be worn under the grey shirt. Blazers may be worn at both the Junior and Senior Campus.
- Scarves and beanies are optional but must be the school standard cardinal red with gold stripe.
 School beanies are available on the Kooga website (Kooga.co.nz).
- Black or other coloured scarves are not to be worn. Gloves must be black.
- Any plain black weatherproof jacket (not cotton) may be worn to and from school. The Kooga JHC jackets are available to order from the Kooga website along with the school hoodies. The jackets may be worn at any time. The school hoodies are only to be worn with the PE uniform, not with the formal uniform.

We have full sizing samples at both Senior and Junior Campuses. Enquire at the office. The key points are;

- Orders are online there is no physical shop.
- Hoodie orders are closed off weekly. (Delivered the following week)

The Size 13/14 soft shell jacket is on back order there are 70 jackets arriving but they won't be here until the end of July. Parents can consider upsizing to an XS (there is only 5cm difference).

They have a foundation of highly talented professional trainers who specialize in a variety of subject areas. In this session students were taught about what makes machines SMART and built a flashing light with an Arduino Simulator during the webinar.

Celebrating Tech 16 - 22 May 2022

This year Mrs Greeff went all out to celebrate Tech. The week started off with Tech Tips to all teachers, and Mrs Greeff's classes were also given these tech tips.

- Tech Tip 1: Computer Desktop Organization Background Images to clear desktop shortcuts
- Tech Tip 2: GMail Filters and Labels
- Tech Tip 3: Using Chrome Bookmarks to manage websites frequently visited
- Tech Tip 4: File Management colour-coding folders, adding emojis, and hashtags, or adding the same file to multiple folders in Google Drive
- Tech Tip 5: Email Signatures that contain your preferred pronouns

The Digital Technologies Programming (DGP) Level 2 students had a Google Meet with Mike Hargreaves from AllTeams Ltd (allteams.co.nz), who are responsible for the new website for James Hargest College. The DGP students built their own JHC websites in DGP Level 1 and they were super impressed with how Adobe XD was used for the mock-ups and the amazing new design for the school. Mrs Greeff was proud of the valuable insight they gave from a student's perspective. The website is very much in the beginning stages of design but it is looking fantastic.





The DGP level 3 class participated in a Google Meet with Timely (www.gettimely.com). Timely's software is used by clients to manage their business, connect with their peers and access education from global industry leaders. The employees in the Meet were a range from product developers, data analysts, cloud specialists, project managers, designers and sales representatives. The students appreciated the invaluable insight they gained by learning the paths each employee took to their place in the tech industry; their roles and responsibilities in the company; and they learnt that a pathway in tech is not necessarily all about coding.



Senior DGP students were given an opportunity to talk with our very experienced Landyn Frisby. Students had the opportunity to ask him questions on his pathway to the ICT (Information and Computer Technology) position at JHC. He chatted to the students about his role and responsibilities as a computer technician; the educational pathways he has taken that prepared him for his role; the JHC network, computer components, computer security; the future of tech at JHC, and much more.

On the Thursday of Tech week, some Level 2 and 3 students took an excursion to SIT Information Technology facilities. Students were impressed with the facility that boasted many computer rooms, especially the hardware room where students are able to tinker with computer components and build computers from the parts available to test their compatibility and whether they function properly.

The solution we came up with was using banana leaves and fibres to create a sustainable and easily made replacement for the plastic bag, we then had to come up with manufacturing costs, selling costs and different factors that could inhibit our bags design.

education and careers in STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics.). The Toloa Pacific STEAM Challenge is a fast-paced two-day event for recipients of the Toloa Scholarship.


