# **INTERNAL ASSESSMENTS**

For Senior Students, Term Two has a lot of internal assessments. All students have a copy of our JHC Student Handbook for assessment which details many important processes. Please chat to your child about assessments and make sure you are aware of important procedures such as what to do when absent from an assessment. If you have any queries, please don't hesitate to get in touch. Here are a couple of key policies you need to be aware of:

# **Appeals**

Why?: If you feel you have been allocated a grade that you dispute or believe you have been treated unfairly. When?: Before you sign off your grade and within one week of assessment being returned. How?: Ask your teacher. **Resolved?** Sign off YES NO Appeal to HOD Sign off YES **Resolved?** NO Appeal in writing to Assessment – YES → Sign off Co-ordinator Resolved? NO Decision and justification minuted

# Qualifications

#### LEVEL 1

#### National Certificate of Educational Achievement NCEA Level One

For a student to be awarded NCEA Level 1, they must achieve 80 credits at Level 1 or higher. 10 credits must be literacy and 10 credits must be numeracy. All courses will offer credits towards NCEA Level 1. Students can achieve these through Achievement Standards, Unit Standards or designated standards in other subjects. NB: A course of 6 subjects could generate up to 140 credits.

#### LEVEL 2

#### National Certificate of Educational Achievement NCEA Level Two

For a student to be awarded NCEA Level 2, they must achieve 80 credits, 60 credits must be Level 2 or higher, 20 credits may be Level 1, OR 80 credits from Level 2. The Level 1 literacy and numeracy requirements must be met.

#### LEVEL 3

#### National Certificate of Educational Achievement NCEA Level Three

For a student to be awarded NCEA Level 3, they must achieve 80 credits, 60 credits at Level 3 or higher and 20 from Level 2 or higher OR 80 credits from Level 3. The Level 1 literacy and numeracy requirements must be met.

# **Minimum University Entrance 2022**

#### National Certificate of Educational Achievement Level 3 (80 credits)

(Must achieve 60 credits at Level 3 and 20 credits may be transferred from Level 2)



Each university may choose to rank students according to their Level 2 and Level 3 results depending on the numbers they have applying.

Please check the university websites for their latest updates. Some universities have additional criteria for specific courses.

NB: If a Special Assessment Conditions assistant is used, the credits obtained do not count for literacy writing.

## **Outdoor Recreation Class**

For Term Two, the Y12 Outdoor Recreation class focuses on tramping and orienteering. The first day tramp was to Barracouta Point which is near Omaui. It was a stunning Southland day with spectacular views on offer, especially Stewart Island. This is where the class will do their final hike - the Rakiura Track. Some of the other day tramps to prepare for Rakiura will be Bluff Hill, Riverton and Makarewa Falls. This is a great course that allows students to see a variety of diverse places in our own backyard.

Constructed from scratch using cardboard and tissue paper. Very strong and sturdy hat built to last. Great use of take away cups, bottle caps and milk bottle lids for decorations. Exceptional use of recycled materials and clever minimalist design of this fascinator made it a stand out entry. The catching and unique. Great example of how keeping the integrity of the materials can add an unexpected and intriguing element to hat design; in this case, the milk bottle is still a milk bottle, but by making it green and placing it so that its curves, moulded edges and the texture of the plastic are the feature, this

bottle is elevated into Mad Hatter Art. Using plates to provide stability and enable the hat to be worn on an angle keeps the hat in proportion and is flattering to the wearer. Well Done! (Pictured below.)





# Winter Uniform Update

#### A reminder about the correct wearing of James Hargest College uniform for the winter season.

- Kilts or A-line skirts may be worn throughout the year at both the Junior and Senior Campus. Skirts must be of a reasonable length, neither very short nor longer than mid-calf. Long pants are available as an alternative for the winter skirt/kilt.
- Undergarment may be a plain white t-shirt, merino or polyprop worn under the white shirt/ blouse/ for extra warmth (should not be visible below blouse/shirt hems or sleeves). Black or white may be worn under the grey shirt. Blazers may be worn at both the Junior and Senior Campus.
- Scarves and beanies are optional but must be the school standard cardinal red with gold stripe. School beanies are available on the Kooga website (Kooga.co.nz).
- Black or other coloured scarves are not to be worn. Gloves may be black.
- Any plain black weatherproof jacket (not cotton) may be worn to and from school. We now have the new Kooga school jackets available to order from the Kooga website along with the school hoodies. The jackets may be worn at any time. The school hoodies are only to be worn with the PE uniform, not with the formal uniform.

# **Oceania Championships** Track Cycling

Following a very successful campaign at the Track Nationals, Ronan Shearing headed to Brisbane for the Oceania Track Champs. There he rode a very full programme, riding in 9 events, 13 races overall in four days. His first event was the Keirin, the event he won a Gold Medal at the NZ Nationals event only two weeks earlier. Ronan narrowly missed a serious crash in the heats where a NZ rider suffered a brain bleed and a serious concussion, he is fortunate to be back on his bike now. Keen to see how he stacked up against the Australians in the final, Ronan rode well and earned a Silver Medal, a fantastic achievement at this level.

In the scratch race, Ronan was very pleased with his race plan and how the race was progressing, unfortunately another rider dived down and slid into him, taking him out of the race. Ronan suffered some burns and his front wheel cracked and was written off.

In his other races, Ronan earned a Silver in the Team Pursuit and a Silver in the Team Sprint. He was placed 4th in the Points Race and 5th in the Kilo.

Ronan was selected for the NZ Team to attend Oceania Champs in both 2020 and 2021, both years the Champs were cancelled. Asked how he maintained his focus, motivation and fitness during all of the uncertainty Covid has created, Ronan said he tried to always stay hopeful. He has trained up to 25 hours a week for these important meets and tried very hard to remain healthy and calm in between. This combined with a highly successful academic record is testament to the drive and commitment Ronan has shown in all aspects.
