
International Students

Excerpt from Gemma's speech

As a senior student, I remember being constantly asked by those around me what I wanted to do in life. More often than not I would shrug my shoulders in response while they reminded me that I still had plenty of time to decide. Fast forward to Year 13 when my time appeared to have run out and I suddenly felt as though I had to choose my entire life ahead of me. It was in this chaotic period that it became apparent just how narrow our perspective of success is. This past semester my English professor taught us about the dangers of the single story in literature. She informed us of the experience of author Chimamanda Ngozi. Chimamanda is a middle-class Nigerian woman who grew up reading English and American literature which focused purely upon the beautiful, white heroine who spoke only of love. Her writing began to reflect these same conventions, never mind that these concepts were foreign to her own

genuine experiences. Growing up with these single stories she felt obligated to copy the masses for her work to be successful, however, this led her to feel as though her work was never entirely her own, and therefore she was never entirely satisfied.

This lesson has stuck with me because it demonstrates how impressionable and vulnerable we are in the face of a single story, particularly as young adults. I felt as though this lesson perfectly reflected the chaotic pressure I felt as a Year 13. Our material society focuses immensely on external success which is measured through one's financial status and professional growth. However, the problem is that external success is extremely fragile and easy to become caught up in if you don't have internal success backing it up. Internal success is the feeling of achievement and wholeness derived from the completion of a task or fulfillment of desire. We have more control over our internal success than our external success as it lies within the power of our choice, the power of our thoughts, and our mindset. Internal success teaches us to step away from the one path that we believe defines success and instead learn to celebrate our individuality as we realize one size does not fit all. Instead of fixating upon achieving success in our lifetime we should instead focus on the significant skills such as grit, resilience, and passion, all of which make up a successful person. For me, success wasn't gaining endorsements and going to university. For me, it was having the courage and determination within myself to pursue what I love.

I can now say that I am the first in my family to attend university where I have achieved pleasing results so far and shall soon begin an internship in which I can further pursue the things I love.

Success is not a single story. There are numerous different forms of success, it simply depends upon your mindset.

Kia Ora,

Last term I was lucky enough to be selected for the University of Sydney, International Science School. It is a 9 day program, during which 150 students from New Zealand, Australia, Japan, and the USA hear lectures from World leading scientists. Lectures include Astrophysicist Elaine

Sadler's experience with new Radio Telescope arrays, Google Artificial Intelligence developer Agüera y Arcas on Computational

Neuroscience and teaching AI to have morals (Pictured left - Simplicity of base Transformers for modern AI), and Veena Sahajwalla, a Material Scientist, Engineer, and Inventor, who founded SMaRT (Centre for Sustainable Materials Research and Technology) and is leading the charge in Micro Recycling Science in Australia, and the World. We also completed practical tasks such as making an electrolysis cell to

decompose water (Pictured right), and making faux-meat burgers. Finally, we got to virtually tour around Quantum, Solar, and Biology labs to see working being done for the future.

Keeping safe and sensible online

At JHC Deans are continuing to deal with incidents which are brought up at school because of inappropriate social media behaviour, often on weekends. Students are still learning to manage their online behaviour and they need supervision to learn how to deal with conflict or perceived slights. Here is a useful guide for communication with your child about their internet use.

Your child's behaviour in the physical world and online world should be the same and should follow the values that you have established as parents and the values that James Hargest College teaches.

Be an active part of your child's social media accounts.

- Make sure all social media accounts are private.
- Have your child's family members, such as aunts and uncles as well as yourself, join their account so that there is an adult presence to support and monitor your child's usage of the account.
- Know the friends your child has as members of their account. Your child should only ever accept friend requests from people they know, even if friends seem to know the person.
- Turn off all comments on YouTube accounts. This will stop people your child does not know potentially making hurtful comments.
- Make it very clear that you will be checking your child's online accounts, and phone messages and usage, on a regular basis. This will let your child know that you are monitoring and that secretive behaviour is not okay.

As your child gets older and is applying for jobs, talk to them about the fact that businesses will check online profiles. It is really important that online identity is promoting positive interactions with family and friends as well as community involvement rather than anti-social behaviour or language, or photos and posts that do not represent your values. John Parsons, an internet safety expert will be speaking to students in October and there will also be a parent information evening where you will have an opportunity to come and hear from John the best way to help guide your child through the complex world of the internet during their teenage years safely.

How to place restrictions on devices accessing your wifi

Using your router's settings is the most common way to set up parental controls on your home network.

The first step is to log in to your router as you would to change your network name and password. Once you've logged in, look for an option for parental controls or access restrictions. The amount of control that you have over your network depends on the kind of router that you have, but common tools allow you to limit screen time, block specific devices and filter web content. You can shut off your entire wireless network, but more often you may want to block only specific devices. That means you can block internet access to your child's iPads or Chromebooks after bedtime or during homework hours, while leaving the family TV or work laptops connected.

Block specific devices

Every device on your network is given a media access control address, or MAC address, which can often be found listed alongside its IP address in the device settings. Every device using wifi will be listed, usually by their nickname (Mum's laptop, SamsungTV, Dad's smartwatch etc). If a name for a device hasn't been set up yet, you'll just have to go by MAC address. From there you can schedule restrictions on devices during certain hours without impacting on the wifi access of other users and devices. So it's only little Johnny's Chromebook, iPad and phone that have no wifi Sunday - Thursday 9pm - 8am.

New cameras at the Senior Campus

Student voice tells us that the greatest student concerns at Hargest are our toilet blocks, especially E and F blocks. The issue is one of students not feeling safe to use these facilities because of the large groups congregating there. Students find it intimidating to use the bathrooms for their intended purpose. We have tried a variety of strategies to change this antisocial behaviour. Irrespective of our best efforts, some students continue to vape in the bathrooms, making others feel unsafe and unwilling to enter. We have also had repeated instances of vandalism, damage and significant messes created in our bathrooms which is very frustrating. In order to combat this situation, and make the bathrooms safe for students to

use again, we have installed cameras in the foyer area of the bathrooms.

We know the vast majority of our students treat our school with respect; are responsible for their own behaviour around our campus and take care of our environment. A very small minority however have continued to make our bathrooms unsafe. We are confident this ability to monitor the bathrooms will help ensure they are safe for all of our students. Students are not to gather in the toilets in groups. We are actively monitoring the cameras to break these habits and to try to change the behaviour of the small minority making others not want to use the toilets.

Other, smaller toilet blocks around the Campus are currently being left unlocked as long as the behaviour remains positive.





'Onevai Pita and Xiara Patino have recently returned from the Senior World Championships for Artistic Swimming held in Budapest.

'Onevai and Xiara both made the step up this year into the Aquaferns, the Senior Women's Artistic Swimming team after both had previously represented the country at junior level.

The World Championships was initially planned for Japan but after they pulled out, Budapest put their hand up to host the event. Both Xiara and 'Onevai were unsure if the event would go ahead right up until the last moment. They started with

a training camp in Auckland where they put on a public display of their two routines, the free team where the entire routine is choreographed according to preference and the combo where there are several compulsory elements. They then travelled to Dubai where they trained for ten days. They also had a chance to do some awesome sight seeing including riding some camels. Unfortunately in Dubai, four of the team tested positive for Covid which meant they could not carry on to Budapest for the start of the World Championships. The Combo event was at the start of the championships and so they missed this event entirely.

After their isolation, they were allowed to travel and made it in time to compete in the Free team event. They were pleased with their performance, and certainly felt they had a lot to learn to compete with the big nations. They saw some amazing routines from the winners. China, Ukraine and Japan medalled in the free event.

It was an amazing trip where both 'Ovevai and Xiara learnt a lot and got to experience vastly different cultures. They were staying in the same hotel as the teams from Thailand, Kazakhstan, Switzerland and Denmark. The buffets for every meal were definitely a highlight!

This was a fantastic culmination of all of their hard work and dedication over this period of uncertainty. We are so pleased you made it and you were able to compete at the highest level. Ka mau te wehi 'Onevai and Xiara!

Waka Ama

The race that caught the hearts of everyone! Southland school teams lined up on Otago Harbour on the Saturday morning of Queens Birthday weekend 2022 to compete in the Icebreaker Waka Ama Challenge, and what a race it was!



All teams stayed in close contact throughout the 5 kilometres, with JHC/SGHS Whero (J19) maintaining the lead throughout. The race started at the OUSA aquatic centre, travelling approx 2kms towards Portsmouth Drive for the first turn. At this turn JHC/SGHS Kōwhai (Intermediate mixed) was able to cut past Verdon men, taking second place, with JHC Kakariki (intermediate women) sitting in a comfortable 4th. After the last turn, with just over 1 km to go, the JHC Kakariki team turned on the power, passing Verdon first then JHC/SGHS

Kōwhai. They tried hard to gain on JHC Whero and in the end there was only 20 seconds between 1st and 2nd.

Waka Ama is also known as Outrigger Canoe. The waka have an ama (outrigger) strapped to the waka with two kiato (arms). The events range from sprints (250 metres to 1500 metres), to long distance (5km to 20km +). Waka crews include W1 (single kaihoe/paddler), W2 (double), W6 (6 kaihoe) and W12 (12 kaihoe). The W12 teams don't have an ama, but instead are two waka strapped with two straight kiato. There are many events throughout New Zealand, and worldwide, throughout the year.

'Icebreaker Challenge' has been hosted by Fire in Ice Outrigger Canoe club every Queens Birthday weekend for the past 21 years, with entrants

from all over New Zealand attending the iconic event. This year was the first year that Hēmi Hakena has entered teams. Hēmi Hakena entered three W6 teams in conjunction with Te Ara a Kewa Waka Ama Trust (TAAKWAT, local waka ama club).

Waka ama has been offered to Hēmi Hakena since 2021, beginning with kaihoe from Junior Campus and supported by Nola Cassidy, Tracey Maclennan and other members from TAAKWAT. In recent months, Ngā Kete Matauranga Pounamu (NKMP) and TAAKWAT have encouraged other Southland schools to learn waka ama, providing training both within and outside of school hours and plan to offer more sprint races throughout the year.

Waka Ama is a sport that anyone can get involved in. It requires nothing but warm clothes and commitment to attend training sessions. The core values of Waka Ama include manaakitanga (care and respect for each other), whanaungatanga (close relationships/kinship), hauora (physical, emotional, mental health) and tū tangata (accountability). 

Taekwondo


