Farewell Ms Chilton-Smith our wonderful leader. Jeanette has been a part of the 6 Layard Street family for 25 years. Her early years were spent teaching at Rosedale Intermediate under the guidance of Principal Paul Ferris. Paul admired Jeanette for her passion for teaching and learning. She also had a keen interest in hydroponics and developed a hydroponic room teaching students how to grow plants in water!

After a short time away in Australia, immersing herself in a world of music, she returned to Rosedale in 1988 as a homeroom teacher under the leadership of the then Principal, Wayne Green. Near the end of 1990 she left to grow her own little family, returning to Rosedale in 2000 to teach as a Home Room teacher and lead the Science semispec team.

Jeanette was part of the team with Rosedale Principal Robyn Harris, who helped the transition when Rosedale and Collingwood Intermediates amalgamated with James Hargest High School to form James Hargest College in 2005. That year Jeanette picked up the wero to become a Specialist Science teacher and donned her white lab coat for several years, becoming famous for pushing her teaching resources around in a cart from class to class while the new purpose-built laboratory was built.

Never failing to set herself goals and striving for excellence, Jeanette was then appointed as Deputy Principal at the beginning of 2007 working alongside the JHC Senior Leadership Team, led by Principal Paul O'Connor. In 2008 Jeanette dipped her toes in the Associate Principal role in an acting capacity. This set her in good stead for working towards applying for and being appointed as Associate Principal in 2014 with Principal Andy Wood.

Ms Chilton-Smith has been involved in the daily life of the College with her participation in road patrol, mountain biking (even breaking her arm while taking students out mountain biking!) Science, meticulously doing the make-up in productions, supporting kapa haka rōpū, art classes, taking extras in classrooms, Citizens of the World American exchange, camps, ski trips, the uniform committee and much much more.



We wish to thank Ms Chilton-Smith for her long service to education, for inspiring young minds and leading with a pastoral heart. Her tireless efforts to keep up to date with current research and in particular the value she places on culturally responsive practice and te reo Māori has guided progress across both campuses. Jeanette is a highly respected educator and is regularly sought after to provide advice and guidance to many school colleagues within our community. Jeanette is a big advocate for children and a wonderfully supportive colleague.

Jeanette is re-living (as opposed to retiring) to Wānaka to pursue her interests in camping, fishing, hiking and painting all the while spending a great deal of time with her mokopuna. We will miss Ms Chilton-Smith greatly and wish her all the very best on those river beds - may the fish bite and the mountain tracks be smooth.

The X Factory production was staged earlier this month. Our super talented students showcased their singing, acting and dancing skills by presenting a very entertaining and engaging musical.






Staff Farewell Junior Campus

of women before us who have given women today the freedom and right to vote. We were also lucky enough to hear from guest speaker Serena Lyders who shared with us the suffrage journey of Aotearoa women from a Māori point of view. I learnt about extremely influential Māori wāhine such as Iriaka Rātana and Meri Te Tai Mangakāhia who helped pave the way for generations of wahine in Aotearoa. Meri Te Tai Mangakāhia did not just request women's right to vote, she was actually the first person to motion wāhine Māori being eligible to sit in the Maori parliament in 1893.

These powerful wahine help us to understand the significant contributions wahine Maori made to women's suffrage in New Zealand and the importance of including their legacy when we celebrate women's rights to vote as equal citizens. Serena also shared her own story of the positive impact she has had on Invercargill's community and the inspirational, supporting wāhine in her own life. Celebrating Womens' Suffrage is not only about recognising the mahi from the women in the past but is also an opportunity to reflect on the women in our own lifes who have positively impacted us. #### This month on SchoolTV - Online Gaming

Games are an integral part of human behaviour. It is normal and healthy for young people to engage in play as a part of their daily lives, including playing games online. Like most activities, online gaming can have both positive and negative outcomes. It can be intimidating and confusing for carers trying to understand a young person's online experiences with many considering that staring at a screen is an unhealthy habit. However, the World Health Organisation believes that as well as the risks, there are also many positive benefits associated with online gaming and these could be key in nurturing bonds with others.

During the pandemic, there was an explosive growth of

gaming as people sought much needed connection during isolation. In the media, gaming often gets bad publicity because most coverage tends to concentrate on the minority of gamers who play to such an extent that it compromises all other areas of their life. However, online gaming can teach young people many skills including teamwork, concentration, communication and problem solving. It requires a level of interaction and skill from the player; unlike watching television, which is more passive.

Online communities provide opportunities for young people to feel socially connected and

have a sense of belonging. At healthy levels, gaming can increase self-esteem and social acceptance. However, any behaviour, when taken to extreme, can also have a negative impact on a young person's everyday life. Understanding online experiences and knowing the warning signs if students are at risk, will help nurture a more positive relationship with online gaming and help your family find the right balance.

If you are concerned about online gaming habits, it's important to consider a number of factors. This edition will provide strategies in how to deal with any issues you may be experiencing. We hope you take time to reflect on the information offered in this month's edition, and we always welcome your feedback.
