Congratulations to our students who were last week representing us all over the South Island for tournament week. It is wonderful to finish the season with a tournament and for students to push themselves against new opponents. There were some great games with fantastic results and some great learning experiences. Thanks so much to all staff and whānau in our community who support these teams and have made these tournaments possible for our athletes. A special mention must go to our Girls Senior A Basketball team who have qualified for nationals which will be held in Palmerston North during the next holidays.

At the recent Polyfest our Junior and Senior Campus Kapa Haka performances were simply stunning. The hours of practice culminated in performances that were full of meaning, passion and pride.

On Wednesday and Thursday of this week the students from our Junior Campus took to the stage to present X Factory. Both of these events are examples of the wonderful talent we have at JHC and of the committed staff we have that make it all happen.

Next Wednesday, our Year 11, 12 and 13 students will begin a week of Derived Grade exams. The importance of these exams cannot be overstated. They serve three purposes - to give students an exam experience prior to the real thing, to act as a checkpoint to let the students know what they still need to work on, and to provide a Derived Grade, in the case of an emergency. Yet again, we are in an environment in which this last point may be more applicable than ever. Over the last two years, the number of our Derived Grade applications has risen exponentially, so no student can be complacent. Preparing well and doing their best in the Evidence Exam

will provide the best opportunity for students to learn from the experience, and add a sense of security in case of any misfortune.

In two weeks our Year 10's are lining up for the NCEA Literacy and Numeracy common assessment tasks as part of the Pilot. Being part of the Pilot is important to us as it means we are best placed to learn what our students know, and what they need to know to achieve these high stakes assessments when they become mandatory from 2024. We wanted to be best prepared for this new challenge and so have opted into the Pilot this year. We look forward to sharing our experience and learnings with our community.

This week voting closed for the election of our Board of Trustees. I would like to thank the members of our community who put themselves forward for this important governance role. I would like to personally thank three members of our current Board who are stepping down, Mr Jason McKenzie, Mr Andrew Boon and our Presiding Member Mr Chris O'Connor. All three have served the College with the utmost integrity and professionalism over many years and as Principal I have appreciated their support.

haka tautoko. We are now getting excited and ready for the Hautonga regional competition next year 2023. Haere mai tētahi āhua, bring it on!



All morning exams have a 9am start except L1MCAT which starts at 9:30am. All afternoon exams start at 1:15pm.

Students should be at their venue 15 mins before the exam starts.

Evidence Exams

Our Evidence Exams run for six school days from Wednesday of Week 8 through to Wednesday of week 9. All morning examinations start at 9am. Students need to sit all of the exams they are entered for in all of their classes. They need to stay for the duration of the examination, even when it ends after 3.20, as the end of year exams do as well.

Students only need to come to school when they have an exam. Otherwise, they should be at home or at school in the library studying. If students take a lot of subjects which do not have an exam, they have been asked to check with their teacher when they can come in during the week to work on internal assessments.

Students need to wear uniform at all times when at school.

Students can take a plastic bag into the exam room with pens, pencils and a calculator inside. They can also have a plain water bottle. Cellphones, watches etc need to be turned off and placed in a plastic bag on the floor in front of the desk.

Check the dates and times of exams carefully. If students have any clashes, they need to come and see Mrs McDowall. If students have entered to sit any examinations digitally, they need to make sure they have practised logging into NZQA and accessing digital papers on the device they will use in the examination. They need to ensure their device is sufficiently charged to last the whole exam.

Evidence Exams are very important for many reasons. They are the closest assessment to the External Examinations in November and will allow students the opportunity to practise in a very similar environment and under similar conditions. They will also be marked according to the assessment schedule which will give valuable feedback about how students are tracking for externals. The other reason these examinations are so important, and for some students become essential, is that they can be used for derived grades.

If something significant happens to a student in November and they are unable to sit an examination, they can apply to NZQA to use a derived grade - which means the grade they earned in the evidence exam becomes their grade for the external examination and they are awarded the credits.

Last year we had over 20 students who applied to use their derived grades. They were people who had recently broken an arm, were attending a funeral, were unwell with tummy bugs and flus. A derived grade might be necessary if you are isolating. If for any reason we were not able to go ahead with external examinations in November, the evidence exam grades would be used for all students for all subjects. Last year we had two students who came to apply for a derived grade to be used because of a situation out of their control. The reason they were missing their exam met the NZQA criteria for using a derived grade, but unfortunately they had Not Achieved Grades from Evidence Exams. The grade you earn in September is the grade that is used if you require a derived grade in November. With the unprecedented times we are living in, it is probably accurate to say more students than ever before will be relying on their derived grade.

Make sure students prepare carefully and give themselves the best chance of success. Behaviour in the exam room must be perfect. Too many students would be affected if we allowed silly, distracting behaviour. If a student disrupts the opportunities of others, they will be removed and no grade awarded. Students will want to achieve highly and take these examinations seriously. Use this time to set up a revision schedule to work through practice exam papers. James Hargest Sporting and Cultural Blues

Students must nominate themselves if they wish to be considered for a JHC Sport, Cultural or \bar{A} whina Blues Award. All nominations will be considered and final decisions will be made by the JHC Blues Committee.

Sporting Blue

To receive a Sporting Blue, students must have represented JHC in the nominated sport and competed or placed at an elite level. Criteria for JHC Sporting Blues:

Represented Southland at under 17 (or equivalent) level or higher and/ or

Gained a top 3 placing at a South Island event and/or Gained a top 4 placing at a New Zealand event

Cultural Blue

To receive a JHC Cultural Blue, students must represent JHC in the chosen area and be selected to perform at an elite level in a prestigious/distinguished Secondary Schools' event.

Music Blue

Selected for an auditioned National Youth or National Secondary Schools' ensemble and/or

Gained a top 3 placing at a national event and/or

Represented Southland or higher at a National Secondary Schools' Contest and/or

Selected at the national level of a song-writing competition

Dance Blue:

Gained a top 3 placing and/or an award of significance at the national level of PACANZ or Showquest and/or Selected to represent Southland at the National level of DanceNZMade

Drama Blue

Selected for an auditioned national level group/event and/or Represented Southland at a National Festival or Contest (e.g. Sheilah Winn) and/or Received a placing or award of cignificance at the patienal level of the

Received a placing or award of significance at the national level of the Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Contest

Debating Blue

Represented Southland or higher at a National Secondary Schools Tournament and/or

Received an award of significance (such as Best Speaker) at a Regional Secondary Schools' Tournament

Kapa Haka Blue

Outstanding leadership/performance/commitment and dedication to Kapa Haka over multiple years including mentoring of junior students and support for teachers in charge. Performance and leadership at the Elite Level

Āwhina Blue

To receive an Āwhina Blue, students must have shown extraordinary dedication across JHC in a Sport and/or Cultural/ and or Service area. Student application must be supported by three staff from JHC who will attest to extraordinary dedication/awhina

Year 10 Literacy and Numeracy Pilot Assessments

NCEA will reduce in size from an 80-credit qualification to a 60-credit qualification for Level 1 and the new Literacy and Numeracy | Te Reo Matatini me te Pāngarau co-requisite standards will become mandatory for Level 1.

Literacy and Numeracy is a package of standards that sit outside of the 60 credits learners need for each level of NCEA. These new standards assess learners on important foundational skills that will help them succeed in NCEA, further learning, life, and work.

To get the co-requisite, learners need to achieve the ten credits in:

- a) the Literacy standards AND
- b) Numeracy standard

All learners will need to achieve the corequisite in order to be awarded their NCEA qualification at any level. It can be achieved at any time from Year 9 – teachers will help learners to know when they are ready to be assessed against the standards.

It is important to know that the corequisite will not stop learners from working towards NCEA. Learners can work towards the

co-requisite at the same time as they work towards the 60 credits needed for each level of NCEA. This is what makes it a co-requisite and not a prerequisite.

More than 360 schools and kura are taking part in the pilot this year including JHC.

The JHC Year 10 students will be sitting the Literacy and Numeracy assessments at the end of Week 9 this term.

In Form time, Social Studies, English and Maths Year 10 students have been practising logging into NZQA and accessing practice papers. On Thursday 22 September and Friday 23 September they will actually sit the writing and reading literacy standard and the numeracy standard. Three assessments in total over the two days. They will be allocated a space either in Gym 1, Gym 2 or the Hall where the whole form class will go and sit the paper. They will



New Night Sky Camera installed

Hargest has joined a world wide array of night sky cameras which are being administered by the University of Ontario in Canada.

Pictured is our Deputy Head Boy and space enthusiast Ronan Shearing with Marshall and Mia from the University of Otago Geology department. The goal is to triangulate the position of any Meteors that fall to the Earth and hopefully retrieve them in order to study this space material.

Our camera is still being calibrated from the University of Ontario but will be available on this website when live: http://istrastream.com/rms-gmn/?country=NZ. This site also gives you access to all the other night sky cameras in the world tracking these space objects.

This week, images were captured by night sky cameras in our Southern Array that show a meteor that is thought to have been intact (and therefore retrievable) that has landed in Otago.

need to make sure their device is fully charged and able to last for both papers. If they have booked a school device, they need to ensure they get to school nice and early to pick it up. They should bring their charger to charge the device between assessments.

We want all students to do their absolute best and then we will be able to see if there are things that lots of students do not know how to do or if there are things we need to teach more explicitly to help them answer the paper.

Our very best advice is to read the questions carefully - in the writing task if it says as a guideline to write 150 words for an answer - you will not pass if you write 20. Read the instructions very carefully before writing an answer. Students have plenty of time - so they do not need to rush and can do their best. If they do not pass, it does not matter and will give us more information about gaps in our teaching programme. If you do pass, you will gain those credits and will not need to sit these assessments again.

If students and parents are keen to have a look at what may be in the paper - you can go on NZQA and see examples of questions. We do not want students to worry about these assessments, they will have other opportunities to sit them, but we do want them to do their very best. Rules of examinations will absolutely apply such as no talking, no phones or watches, and we will be supervising these assessments carefully.

The students then had the opportunity to take these games to Ruma lwa, on the Junior Campus, to share their games and the knowledge they had learnt. Five students took up this opportunity. An hour was spent playing the games. The students were engaged and focussed. They listened and had fun.





The Year 7 students had the opportunity to give feedback to the senior students. One of the common themes was that they enjoyed playing the games and learning at the same time. Some of the students also enjoyed the fact that they got to play with money and there were also punishments (in the form of star jumps) if they got a question wrong. The Year 10 students enjoyed going to the Junior Campus and engaging with other levels of students. They enjoyed the chance to share their knowledge and, for some, visit their old classroom.

Both teachers involved found the activity beneficial and will look at making this a regular occurrence.
