In a German school I visited I spoke to a class of Year 11 students, who were somewhat jealous of the range of subjects that we have on offer. In their school, there were virtually no practical subjects, no workshops, no foods rooms, no Art, no Music, no Drama. They have no choice in the subjects that they have to take, they all have to take the same. They start at 8:15am in the morning and 3 days a week finish at 5pm. So they have very little time for extra curricular sport and cultural activities. I have shared this with students at our recent assemblies with the message that sometimes our situation isn't as bad as what it seems at the time, it all depends on what we are comparing it to. Sometimes, a little perspective can go a long way.

The October meeting of the JHC Board of Trustees was the first full meeting with the newly elected Board and it was a great opportunity to sit around the table and discuss the role the Board plays in governance of the school. After having held a role on the Board for a number of years, it is an honour to have been voted the Presiding Member and I look forward to working with Mike, the Leadership Team and the board over the next three years.

We also welcomed Sewmi Dissanayaka (pictured right) as the Student Representative on the Board of Trustees.

We thank Sewmi for putting up her hand for this important role and look forward to hearing her perspective on the issues presented to the Board.

Ian Richardson, the Head of Department for the Student Support Center spoke to the Board this month and presented his report. He shared the overarching vision for the Centre where kaiako and ākonga interact within the Mana Ōrite mō te Mātauranga Māori concept of whānau. Whānau comprises kaumātua (staff), pakeke (parents, caregivers, aunts and uncles) and ākonga. Traditionally whānau often had their own plot in communal gardens and their own places to fish and hunt. Historically the whānau was self-sufficient in most matters – this helps to guide the interactions with service providers and is a reminder that the relationships that lead to meaningful work are a link that ensure ongoing success for graduates. The data and the numbers are a useful tool in looking at the way the center operates, but the anecdotes and the success and confidence of the students you work with are the real testament to your success. Thank you for all the wonderful work you and your team do and the immense value you add to JHC. The Board also heard about upcoming camps and trips, as well as planning

BYOD

We strongly recommend that all students from year 7 - 13 are equipped with a personal device for 2023.

Since introducing 1:1 device use with a pilot class 8 years ago, we have been 'rolling up' a 1:1 device learning environment year by year. During this time the school has transformed many of its other systems to digital platforms. Students in all year 7-13 classes now routinely use access to their school digital platform (Google for Education) for their normal work. Device use is about 'which

technology is best' – device or paper and pen, and often this means using both at once.

In 2023 we continue to support this process. It is important that we prepare students for their future.

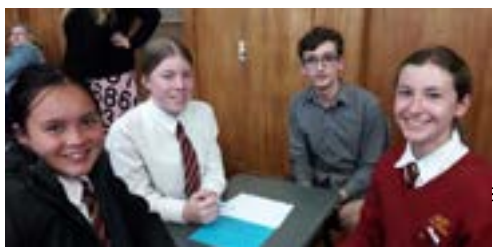

A Guide To Safe Partying

Teenage gatherings provide young people with important opportunities to interact and build on their social skills and experiences. Celebrations, partying and socialising are a fundamental rite of passage and one of the most important aspects of a young person's life. However, it is possible for the best young person to get carried away with their peers and the euphoria of the moment.

For parents and caregivers, keeping your young person safe can at times feel daunting and is often a compromise and a challenge. Most teenagers try to do the right thing most of the time, but your leadership as a role model is crucial. Your child may appear to be physically large and mature, but this is not necessarily matched by their emotional maturity and responsibility in behaviour.

Every party has the potential to get out of hand as sometimes it's hard for young partygoers to make good decisions. Communication and regular discussions are vital, particularly because young people are often faced with peer pressure to do things they prefer not to engage in. Hosting a celebration at home or at a venue can be a fun and memorable event but it is important to agree on the ground rules well before your event is announced to ensure there are no misunderstandings later on.

If hosting an event, you owe your guests a 'duty-of-care' and should ensure all reasonable steps are taken to keep partygoers safe. This Special Report provides caregivers with a list of things to consider when planning a celebration. We hope you take a

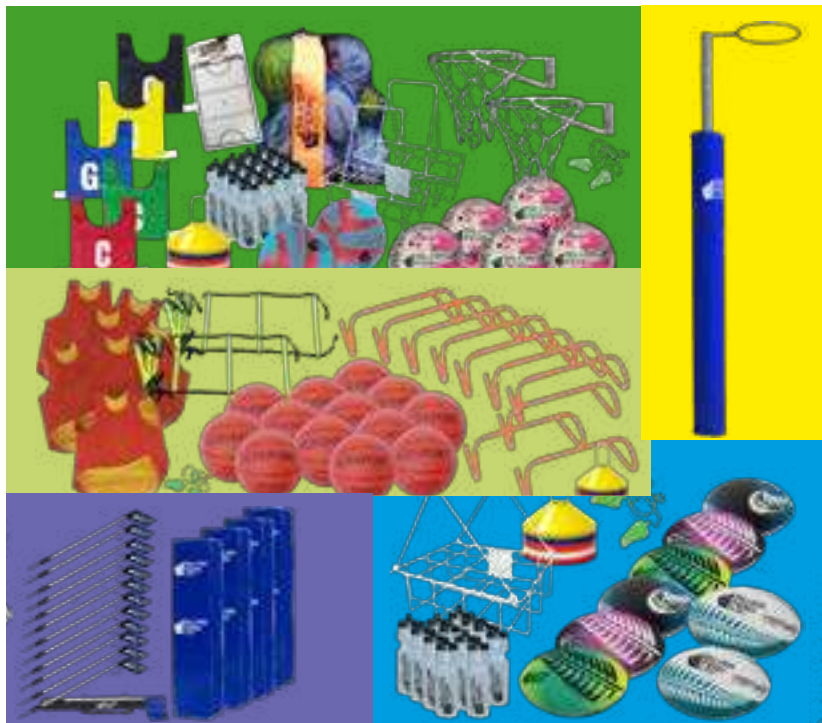
