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

## **BYOD**

We strongly recommend that all students from year 7 - 13 are equipped with a personal device for 2023.

Since introducing 1:1 device use with a pilot class 8 years ago, we have been 'rolling up' a 1:1 device learning environment year by year. During this time the school has transformed many of its other systems to digital platforms. Students in all year 7-13 classes now routinely use access to their school digital platform (Google for Education) for their normal work. Device use is about 'which

technology is best' – device or paper and pen, and often this means using both at once.

In 2023 we continue to support this process. It is important that we prepare students for their future.

#### Which Device?

 As a school we have found chromebooks to be robust and cost effective. These are recommended for year 7 to 13, remembering that Senior subjects may require a device with higher specifications. iPads are not recommended as they have less functionality when using the Google platform.

#### **Senior Subjects**

If you are wanting to use your device for senior subjects such as Art, DVC, DT, Media Studies and Music; a device with higher specifications may be required. Please see the software websites for more details.



## Meningococcal Vaccine Information

Meningococcal disease affects many Kiwis. It's important to know that there is a vaccine available.

The meningococcal vaccine protects against meningococcal disease. Meningococcal vaccine is also called Menactra®, NeisVac-C®, Nimenrix® and Bexsero®.

Although meningococcal disease can affect anyone, teenagers and young adults living closely with others (eg, in boarding schools or university halls of residence) are at high risk and should be vaccinated to protect against meningococcal disease.

Menactra® is free for people aged 13 to 25 years who, within the next 3 months will be living, or are in the first year of living in:

• boarding school hostel

• university hall of residence

Menactra, NeisVac-C and Bexsero are free for people who have low immunity from certain medical conditions, or if they are a close contact of a meningitis case. Meningococcal vaccines help protect you for up to 5 years. Talk to your healthcare provider if your last one was more than 5 years ago.

#### This month on SchoolTV - Bullying

Bullying is an ongoing or repeated misuse of power in relationships, with the intention to cause deliberate psychological harm. Bullying behaviours can be verbal, physical or social. It can happen in person or online, via various digital platforms and devices and it can be obvious or hidden. Bullying in any form or for any reason can have immediate, medium and long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders.

Despite the efforts made to reduce bullying behaviours, the research tells us that one in four students still report being

bullied every few weeks. However, not all negative behaviour should be considered bullying. The key difference is that bullying does not stop on its own. It's important young people learn how to identify behaviours that are rude, behaviours that are mean, and behaviours that are related to bullying.

Often the reasons for bullying can be complex. Some young people do it to get approval from others, some do it to regain control, whilst others may do it because it makes them feel safe. Supporting young people as they work through their emotions will help them unpack the motivation and reason behind the behaviour.

In this edition of SchoolTV, caregivers can better understand why some young people engage in bullying behaviours and what to do to support a child experiencing it. We hope you take time to reflect on the information offered in this month's edition, and we always welcome your feedback.




