We have been hosting international students for several years and we love having them.

This year we had Wei Wei, he has been a blast. Jaylen-Blaze loves to scooter so Wei Wei brought his roller blades with him from Thailand and they have spent many evenings racing each other.

Having an International Student has been an eye-opener for us in learning about different cultures. As he is an only child it has been like having a brother around. Jaylen-Blaze says he always feels so excited when a new student arrives, and is sad when they go. We are still in contact with some of our previous students. Wei Wei has cooked Thai meals for us and it's so interesting how they cook differently. The meals have been yummy. Wei Wei's English has been great so communication has been easy and the information booklet you get about the student helps you to plan before they come.

We have normal household rules such as no technology at night, and he helps with chores like dishes. Wei Wei has just blended in as part of the family. I cook my normal meals and make normal school lunches and it all gets eaten. Each student has had a favourite kiwi food like cheese, or chocolate and cookie time cookies are a hit! International students are here to be part of a family so I just treat them like one of my own, going about our normal family activities, going to family gatherings, to the park/ beach it's just normal living with an extra child. The support from the school is awesome . We can text or email them for anything and because we have opportunities to meet up with other host families we also have their support as well. 
### Southland Under 18 Men's Hockey


### Anzac Services



### **PPTA Industrial Action**

The PPTA (Post Primary Teachers Association) has given notification to the James Hargest College Board that members intend to take further industrial action during Term 2.

Confirmed action is as follows:

Continuing the relief ban undertaken during Term 1

 Only supervise, not teach, their normally scheduled classes if students from other classes are added because relief teachers can't be provided.

 Starting a ban on meetings outside of school hours (8:30am-4:30pm)

Further planned action (we receive confirmation 3 days before such action) is as follows:

– A rolling one-day national strike - Tuesday 9 May (for the South Island). JHC will be closed for instruction for all students.

 For 6 weeks PPTA members nationwide are withdrawing their labour for certain year levels on certain days (partial strike). As a large number of our teaching staff are PPTA members we will have to roster year levels home on these days. The rostering home plan is:

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
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



### Leo Leadership Course

On the 16th of April, a large group of about 29 students from all over the lower South Island set off for a 6 day camp at Borland Lodge, splitting into two groups (orange and blue). Once arrived at Borland Lodge the orange group started to pack for their three day tramp from Borland Lodge to Green Lake on day 1. Then from Green Lake to Lake Monowai on day 2. Finally continuing back to Borland Lodge day 3 and finishing the day off with kayaking. Whilst orange did this, the blue group were settling into Borland Lodge and completing multiple activities over the next 3 days such as, caving, canyoning, rock climbing, abseiling and kayaking. On Tuesday both the blue and orange group spent the night at Borland Lodge. On this night both groups played ultimate archery and gathered together to socialise with the other group and talk about their experiences. As the evening came to a close we had our first debrief. These were a massive part of the course as it allowed us to look back on our tramp or activities and how we treated each other. As the week went on we would continue to have these debriefs. Once Wednesday came around the blue group set off on their three day tramp, which was different to the oranges. They went up the Mt Burn saddle, and did a lot of bush bashing to Green Lake. The next day

they hiked and then camped close to Borland Bivvy, and came out back to the lodge on Friday morning. During this it was the orange groups turn to experience caving, canyoning, rock climbing and abseiling. This was such an amazing and thrilling experience where every activity was a mixture of fun, scary and exciting. These activities were designed to push most out of their comfort zone but that didn't worry any of us. Majority of the students started off as complete strangers and left as close friends and strong leaders. There were so many different skills and techniques that we could take away from this. The confidence to lead a group of people through caves or just being able to respect and follow the people we designated our leaders. We highly recommend this leadership course to anyone aged 16-19 years old who is willing to try new things and boost their leadership skills.



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
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
