



ShowQuest



Academic Integrity Matters: Guarding Against Plagiarism in the Age of ChatGPT

Curriculum Evaluation



We have been researching different options and we would now like to gather information from within school and from our community. - Review and evaluate the effectiveness of our current curriculum to determine how well this is meeting the needs of our students.
- Make recommendations based on findings to the Senior Leadership Team for possible curriculum

The survey has five questions focused on specific aspects we are keen to explore. If you are keen to share your thoughts and have not yet responded, please do so asap. Following those questions, there is an opportunity to comment broadly on any aspect of our curriculum, if you wish

Here is the summary of behaviours teachers will be reporting against:

Effort

- · Completes work to a high personal standard in a timely manner.
- · Brings all eoupment to class.
- Demonstrates a self-disciplined attitude to all activities.
- · Persists when learning is difficult.
- Actively listens to teacher explanations and instructions
- · Participates in group and class activities.
- · Is on time and wears the uniform correctly

Respect

- · Shows respect for self, others and all property
- · Treats others fairly, listens and responds to different opinions respectfully.
- Is honest and takes responsibility for all actions
- Uses appropriate and respectful language.
- Each category is reported on a four-point scale: Consistently, Usually Occasionally and Rarely. These reports will also have attendance data for each class as the correlation between attendance and academic performance is widely publicised.

Comments on your child's work and achievement is provided in real time through the Kamar Portal Live Reports are linked to either progression checkpoints or significant pieces of work. They may or may not have a grade published, depending on the context of the teacher's comment. Teachers are asked to write a brief comment that provides feedback to the students and advice on next steps. You as the parent, are looking in on the conversation between the teacher and the student. By publishing these through Kamar - as and when the teacher has feedback to offer - students and parents are able to have up-to-date information on a student's learning progress, rather than wait until halfway through a year to receive information in a more traditional school report format

End of Term Two and Four

Twice yearly you will receive an achievement report which shows grades earned in all subjects as well as attendance data. These reports will include a student reflection and gool setting comment. Students will be asked to look at what they have achieved over the previous two terms and look forward to what they want to focus on next. These are designed to give you an achievement summary and another opportunity for a learning discussion with your young person. There will also be a comment from your child's Homeroom or Form Teacher about their progress to

Parents and carers can play a crucial role in their children's mental health. CSC managed to get one back after a lucky bounce which took the ball toward the Hargest goal and was neatly dispatched past Lucas McNaught in the red goal. Hargest bounced back almost immediately with Mr Tull claiming his second.
