As we come to the end of another busy term there is plenty for us to reflect on and be proud of. On Friday at the Senior Campus we held our annual inter-house Haka Competition. The judges commented on how close the Houses were in their performances and watching, it was hard to pick a winner. What was clearly evident was how far we have come in terms of manaakitanga (fostering mana), tika (accuracy) and pono (integrity) of our Haka. Haka is a powerful tool, it helps to teach students about whakapapa (genealogy), tikanga (Māori lore), tūpuna (ancestors), Atua Māori (Māori

gods) and most importantly it reconnects them to themselves and builds a sense of belonging and connection. The full Senior Campus staff and student Haka at the end of the event was simply awesome, ka rawe to mahi.

Term Three on the Junior Campus is always a busy one with significant classroom learning and extracurricular activities. If we think back to Showquest, Polyfest, Junior Production, Speech Competitions, Oamaru exchange and the range of winter sports operating, it's great to see students making the most of the opportunities available to them. Particular thanks to our staff for the lengths they go to, not only for the quality classroom experience they provide, but also for extra opportunities they provide for our students.

Our senior students have recently completed their Evidence Exams as we start the countdown to end of year externals. Use of animals in research in New Zealand

BCITO Achievement




Junior Campus





Future Ready Farms


Future Ready Farms Innovation Challenge Day, run by the Young Enterprise Scheme was held on Tuesday 5th September.





Wifi Innovation

The Internet in a Box

Michael Clinckett has been working hard on a project called "The Internet in a Box" for his Digital Technologies Programming Level 3 class.

It all started when Michael and his friend Forrest Lung were working on creating a Coffee Cart Ordering App for our school. Everything was going smoothly until they hit a little roadblock – sending email confirmations and verifications. The software they were using didn't allow them to add libraries to the system, which meant they couldn't send emails with it.

Michael came up with a brilliant solution: he built an email server. He created a system where an external computer reads data from a hidden page and uses it to send emails.

This clever contraption contains some pretty nifty components:

An Arduino D1 R1 board: This little guy handles the HTTPS requests and email sending.

An Arduino nano: It keeps an eye on the temperature of the unit and controls a 12V fan based on the temperature.

- A double AA battery holder: To keep things powered up.
- A Piezo: This is like a little alarm that lets you know if there's a power failure. Because if the power goes out, no emails will be sent.
- A 12V fan: To keep things cool inside the box.
- A 5V relay: This helps control the fan.

- A 5V to 12V converter: In case you can't find one pre-built online, Michael can help you make one from individual parts.
- A small breadboard: Where all the magic happens.
- A temperature and humidity sensor: To make sure things don't get too hot and humid in there.
- Some green, red, and blue LEDs: Because, let's face it, blinking lights are cool!

This project is not just about sending emails; it's about problem-solving, creativity, and using technology to make our lives easier. Michael has shown us that with determination and a bit of innovation, you can overcome any obstacle.

This is a shining example of how technology can be harnessed to solve real-world problems. We can't wait to see what he and Forrest come up with next


