I am pleased to report a very settled and positive start to the academic year on both campuses. Our first day, 31 January, saw our traditional Ka Hikitia (step up) march for our Year 9 students followed by a mihi whakatau. Later in the morning our new Year 7 students were also formally welcomed by way of a mihi whakatau. In both of these ceremonies our Hargest Values were highlighted as who we are and what we strive to be. Our current student roll is just over 1940 students, which is the largest JHC has seen in recent history. We are also fully staffed in both our teaching and support staff areas. We have some wonderful additions to our staff and we look forward to what they bring to our students and kura. I would like to congratulate our students for the way in which they have responded to our phone free stance, there has been little fuss and teachers are reporting an improvement in the classroom. We are seeing more students involved in physical activity at break times and the campus is audibly louder as students are talking to each other. Connections are deeper when we are physically present as opposed to communicating via social media.

Our Outdoor Education Programme is underway on the Junior Campus with our Year 7 and 8 students heading to Omaui and Deep Cove respectively. We are very fortunate to have these natural environments for our students to experience and enjoy. A big thank you to the staff for all of their organisation and of course our parent helpers, without whom these camps wouldn't happen. A great school is a busy school and there are a multitude of opportunities for our rangatahi at JHC.

From the Boardroom

Kia ora koutou,

The JHC Board of Trustees met for the first time this year last week. It was great to hear about the start to the school year and be reminded of the busy, dynamic kura that is James Hargest College. The first item on the agenda was overnight trips and we were once again reminded of the fantastic opportunities all our students are given to be involved and active participants in their learning. Deep Cove and Omaui Camps hit the road very soon and these awesome outdoor experiences are truly something special we know our Year 7 and 8 students will remember forever. The Science Trip to Sydney and Antarctica was away as we met, what an incredible chance for those

opportunities for their students. The Board understands the work these trips take and we sincerely thank you for all that you do to make sure students from James Hargest College can build their sense of identity and realise their potential.

The board was treated to a showing of a new Pou created for James Hargest College by sculptor John Wishart. The Pou honours the spirit of Brigadier James Hargest, the statesman, farmer and the warrior. Made from a farm totara strainer post, it reflects the strength of character and the unwavering determination that the Brigadier held and demonstrated time after time to the men who served under him in WW2. John and Al Pannet spoke to the Board about the inherent symbolism of the Pou. The "Pintle" or gate hinge reflects the farming background of the Brigadier who farmed at Rakauhauka, a few kilometres from where the school stands. The hinge holds the gateway and the destiny we make for ourselves. The rifle, an Enfield 303 was standard issue to troops under his command. It references his military contribution in both world wars and the warrior we remember. We are very grateful to both Al and John for this taonga for our school. It is a special reminder of our namesake and his fortitude which has inspired our school values.

Phone Free JHC was also discussed at the meeting and the board was briefed

on how this is currently working. The immediate observations from the Senior Leadership Team was that already, more students are being active at break times and also that they are noticeably talking to each other more. There has been substantial support from our community for the implementation of phone free JHC and this new way of being has started without any significant issues. We are fortunate to be part of a school community with a Leadership Team who take the time to consider the implementation of any new rules or procedures and phone free JHC is indicative of their willingness to consider what is right for the education of the rangatahi in their care. Inside the classroom there has been anecdotal evidence of fewer distractions and more engagement for our learners. The significant support from home has allowed Phone Free JHC to simply become the new way of being and allowed for many advantages with regards to both academic development and pro social skills. The last line of our Vision captures this succinctly: We aspire to provide education of superb quality, in partnership with our wider community. For the 1940 students currently at JHC, that continues to shape our decision making.

Brigadier James Hargest, we remember him

Brigadier James Hargest 1891 -1944, CBE, DSO and TWO BARS, MC, VD, MP was a statesman, a farmer and a decorated war hero. Our school is proud to bear his name. His life story has inspired generations of our students, past and present, and will continue to do so in the future. His achievements and characteristics are celebrated in our school values, our school crest and in our school's motto, Keep Faith. This Pou, carved by sculptor John Wishart, honours the spirit of Brigadier James Hargest and his enduring importance to our kura. The Pou appropriately started life as a tōtara farm strainer post. Strainer posts are considered the most important posts in the fence line. They carry the strain of the fence and

support the gates. The totara strainer post from which the Pou began represents the strength of character and unwavering cornerstone of support that the Brigadier was to the men who served under him in WW2. The

"pintle" or gate hinge is both a literal nod to the Rakauhauka farming background of the Brigadier, and also a metaphorical symbol of the opportunity within all of our rangatahi to determine their own path. A pintle hinge has all the benefits of a higher safety profile, demonstrating the secure base of manaakitanga and whanaungatanga we provide for all ākonga as well as the greater range of movement which represents the multitude of opportunities within and beyond our school gates.

The rifle embedded in the sculpture is an Enfield 303, standard issue to troops under his command. It references his military contribution in both World Wars and the leadership, mana and fortitude he demonstrated in every circumstance. In 1958 James Hargest Memorial High School was opened as a living tribute to this exceptional Southlander. This Pou will look down on us and guide our kura as we seek everyday to fulfil our Mission "to equip all our students to create the best possible future for themselves and their world." We are grateful for the lessons and the guiding force our namesake has gifted us. His name, tenacious resilience and responsibility are a taonga we value highly.

Brigadier's Diploma

We are thrilled to share the results of our whakaaro and kōrero around the ways we will recognise learning in Year 11

This Diploma provides the framework against which students are now assessed in Year 11. It maintains and protects academic rigour, while incorporating wider holistic educational goals. Year 11 is an important year where students are gaining the skills and knowledge to achieve to the best of their ability in NCEA Level Two the following year.

Course of Study


Students will undertake three compulsory courses in English, Maths and Science. Students also select three additional specialist subjects from our wide range of options.

Diploma Structure

Each Subject counts towards the total academic score. The total maximum score per course is 8. The six scores are added to create a score out of 48. The table converts the score to a Diploma Level. The Diploma may also be endorsed with important aspects such as Sports, Cultural or Āwhina contribution.

Assessment towards the

Diploma: There are common assessment opportunities (minimum of 4) in each subject. They can consist of projects, presentations, tests, homework, examinations, checkpoints and planning materials. These will be dependent on the course. Assessments contribute to a total score for the course, which is then marked on a scale of 1-8.

Every Day Matters

In New Zealand there is a very clear relationship between attendance at school and achievement in NCEA. Simply put, students who regularly attend school are much more likely to achieve NCEA qualifications than students who do not attend as regularly.

Students who attend school 100% of the time achieve, on average, 13 to 15 more credits in NCEA than do students who attend 90% of the time. In 2019, the then Associate Minister of Education Tracey Martin, identified that "students attending 95 percent of days in Year 10 later get an average of 75 credits at Level 3", easily enough to gain the qualification. Conversely, "Year 10s who attend 85 percent of the time, only about half go on to achieve NCEA Level 3."

While the attendance data we are provided with by the Ministry of Education shows that our rangatahi attend school more regularly than all of the comparison groups, the percentage of students who regularly attend has declined over recent years. This trend was accelerated by Covid-19 which means the data from 2019 is the most comparable data we have to use for this year. Beginning in Week Four of this term you will receive attendance reports three times a term to help keep you informed about your child's level of attendance. Where there are concerns we will be in contact with you to offer our support so that we can help all students to attend regularly and consequently give themselves the best chance of achieving their potential.

Our aim is to have all ākonga attending school 90% of the time as a minimum. While 90% sounds like a high number, this equates to missing one day of school each fortnight, which translates to nearly a month of school lost over the course of the year.

Our school Guidance Counsellors, Homeroom Teachers, Deans and Form Teachers are available to support you in removing barriers to support attendance and achievement. If you are concerned about your child we encourage you to make contact with us sooner rather than later so that we can work with you and support can be put in place before any attendance issues, or other problems, become ingrained habits that are more difficult to change.

Thank you for your support of this important mahi. Lifting attendance rates benefits all students and is an essential step on the pathway to success.

Guide to reporting 2024 Senior Campus

Our reporting is continually developing in response to best practice in both assessment and feedback based on educational research. As you continue your journey as a parent at James Hargest College, we trust that our reporting provides you with great starting points for meaningful learning discussions with your rangatahi. We have three key report types at James Hargest College in 2023. These are all distributed via the Kamar Portal.

1. Reporting on the Hargest Way

Hargest Way reports are released three times per term. These are designed to give whānau, students, and the pastoral team an indication of how a student is tracking across their subjects by looking at the trends in the report. They are useful in highlighting any changes in work patterns as a prompt for further discussions. They should not be treated as a definitive comment on a student's success, but rather an indicator as to whether a student is on track or not. There are two categories in the report: Effort and Respect.

Here is the summary of behaviours teachers will be reporting against:

Effort

- Completes work to a high personal standard in a timely manner.
- Brings all equipment to class.
- Demonstrates a self disciplined attitude to all activities.
- Persists when learning is difficult.
- Actively listens to teacher explanations and instructions.
- Participates in group and class activities.

Respect

- Shows respect for self, others and all property.
- Treats others fairly, listens and responds to different opinions respectfully.
- Is honest and takes responsibility for all actions
- Uses appropriate and respectful language.
- Is on time and wears the uniform correctly.

Each category is reported on a four-point scale: Consistently, Usually, Occasionally and Rarely. These reports will also have attendance data for each class as the correlation between attendance and academic performance is widely publicised.

2: Live Reports

Comments on your child's work and achievement is provided 'in real time' through the Kamar Portal. Live Reports are linked to either progression checkpoints or significant pieces of work. They may or may not have a grade published, depending on the context of the teacher's comment. Teachers are asked to write a brief comment that provides feedback to the students and advice on next steps. You, as the parent, are 'looking in' on the conversation between the teacher and the student. By publishing these through Kamar - as and when the teacher has feedback to offer - students and parents are able to have up-to-date information on a student's learning progress, rather than wait until halfway through a year to receive information in a more traditional school report format.

3: Achievement Reporting end of Term Two and Four

Twice yearly you will receive an achievement report which shows grades earned in all subjects as well as attendance data. These reports will include a student reflection and goal setting comment. Students will be asked to look at what they have achieved over the previous two terms and look forward to what they want to focus on next. These are designed to give you an achievement summary and another opportunity for a learning discussion with your young person. There will also be a comment from your child's Homeroom or Form Teacher about their progress to date.

Your voice is important to us

Rongohia te Hau Action Plan 2024

Last year our whole kura went through the Rongohia te Hau process supported by the Poitama Pounamu team from Waikato University. This process involved staff PLD, a significant number of surveys as well as "walkthrough" observations of every classroom in our kura. The data from all of these was then combined to give us feedback on what we are doing well, and what we need to think about and improve upon. Thank you very much to all whānau who took the time to give us feedback about James Haregst College in these surveys. Your feedback genuinely makes a difference and we consider it very carefully when we plan our next steps. From Rongohia te Hau, the feedback was definitely around key themes, How can we hear our students and whānau? In our classrooms are we having courageous conversations? Are we all open to learning? There was a clear difference in our survey data in regards to how effectively we think we are applying the principles of ako (The concept of ako describes a teaching and learning relationship, where

the educator is also learning from the student and where educators' practices are informed by the latest research and are both deliberate and reflective. Ako is grounded in the principle of reciprocity and also recognises that the learner and whānau cannot be separated.) and how students and whānau perceive this in our classrooms. We have created an Action Plan for 2024 with key aspects to try to address this disparity.

The key aspects of our Action Plan this year include: Early and regular open invitation whānau hui. The key pātai we would love your help with are: What information do whānau want to hear from us? How would they like to receive this information? What are your aspirations for the education of your tamariki? How can we work with you to help them achieve their dreams?

The second key aspect we have implemented as a result of your feedback this year is more regular, focused student voice in all of our classrooms. All ākonga will be asked regularly things like: How do I have the opportunity to share my ideas and contribute to my own learning in the classroom? Each teacher will be using this data in their mahi and will be engaged in discussion with others about what they personally learnt and then what changes they made as a result.

There are other changes such as targeted teaching in form time and systemic changes to the way we document classroom practice. We are working hard to address the disparity between what teachers think we are doing and what whānau think we are doing. You, as the stakeholders in education here have a strong voice and we are always keen to listen.

There will be an information booklet given with key details, this will also be emailed to all Year 9 whānau.

Following your time with Form Teachers, you are invited back to the staffroom for a cup of tea. There will be staff on hand to answer any queries you may have about how the Senior Campus works.

Academic Excellence

For Academic Excellence the Hargest system of awards is based on the NZQA system of endorsing certificates with Excellence, except that Excellence credits must be earned in one calendar year (ie 2023). To gain a general Excellence a student must gain at least 50 Excellence Credits at that or a higher level.

Subject/Course Excellence

To gain Subject/Course Excellence a student must gain 14 or more credits at Excellence in a subject in one calendar year. Of these, at least 3 credits must be from externally assessed standards and at least 3 credits from internally assessed standards in that subject.

100 Club

Students who get 100 Excellence credits are invited to join our elite 100 Club.


The Wellbeing Barometer 2024 The Wellbeing Barometer survey has proven to be an invaluable tool for schools, providing insights into the state of youth mental health and wellbeing.

Whilst last year's results focussed the spotlight on areas of concern, there were also many highlights that demonstrated the resilience and adaptability of students and emphasised the necessity of prevention strategies.

Participating in this year's survey, will assist in identifying areas of strength and concern, as well as pinpointing opportunities for early intervention. Previously gathered information has helped support families as they navigate difficult conversations that enable understanding and foster connections to build relationships.

This survey is part of an ongoing, longitudinal study, with the results being instrumental in tailoring support for students and their families. Participation is strongly encouraged, as it provides

Using the portal enables you to keep up to date with the following aspects of your child's education:

- School reports
- Absences and timetables
- School daily notices
- Academic results including NCEA results
- Contact details
- Account information

The portal can be accessed through the app - available for both apple and android devices, or a direct web address:

If you download the Kamar app, then in Settings under "Name" you could use your child's name or Hargest (if you have children at different schools). You will need to add the server address: https:// kamarportal.jameshargest.school.nz/index.php

The username for the Kamar App is your child's ID number and check your email for the caregiver's password. They will be sent out agian next week.

SchoolAppsNZ is an app that allows you to report your child is going to be absent from school (please remember to give the reason), as well as links to the Kamar portal, daily notices, school alerts, and news. Download SchoolAppsNZ and choose James Hargest College. Ensure you register for the correct year level for your child.

Phone Free JHC

The implementation of Phone Free JHC has been very successful so far across our kura. Thank you very much to our community for all of their support. We know that 80% of whānau supported our initiative to become Phone Free across the school day, and it is certainly thanks to your support that it is working so well and making a difference for rangatahi. Noticeable changes already have been an increase in balls being taken out from the sports office at breaks and many students choosing to be more active with their friends. Also during break times, the increase in conversation between students has been noticed and remarked on frequently. Our kura feels "noisier" in a very good way. In our classrooms the effects are being noticed every day by our teachers.

Many have stated Phone Free JHC has allowed them to have a much better start to the year. Students know they cannot use phones and therefore teachers do not have to monitor this and then deal with infringements. They can simply focus on getting to know their rangatahi, finding out about who they are and what motivates them as well as teaching and learning.

Data from NetSafe in 2021 shows our teens spent 42 hours a week online on average - more than double what they spent in 2012. It's some of the heaviest internet use in the OECD. Added to that fact, 4 in 10 teenagers currently use 5 or more social media platforms. Heavy social media use is also correlated with an increase in depression and anxiety, and there is also an opportunity cost - it's time that could otherwise be spent reading, outdoors, or with friends. We have asked some students to track their screen time on their phone and report back any changes. We are looking forward to seeing that data. So far students have been wonderful and when asked how it is going, many respond with "It is what it is". For those who have broken the rules and been caught, we have followed our process and this too had not been an issue. Overall, the changes at James Hargest College appear wholly positive. Once again, thank you very much for your support of this change which is intended to improve teaching and learning for our ākonga, and already appears to have other significant pro social benefits. Uniform Code

- Skirt: Hargest green A-line skirt.
- Kilt: Hargest kilt to be worn with mid brown tights or above the knee beaver brown socks and the long sleeved white shirt (skirt or kilt may be worn throughout the year, kilt not worn with polo shirt)
- Trousers and Shorts: Regulation grey. Long trousers are worn with white shirt and tie at the Senior Campus.
- Shirt: White blouse with long sleeves, pointed collar and straight hem or white sleeve shaped hem with tie, only worn with the trousers or long sleeved, straight hem grey flannel.
- Polo: White short sleeved polo shirt with Hargest collar stripes and pocket monogram. May be worn with grey skirt or shorts.
- Socks: ¾ white below the knee socks or white sockettes or grey with regulation red and gold top or grey with regulation red and gold top.
- Tie: Red, gold, grey; must be worn with long-sleeved blouse with summer and winter uniform.
- Shoes: Plain black leather, laced, flat, dress (NOT t-bar).
- Belts: Black or dark grey with standard buckle.
- Jersey: Cardinal red V necked jersey with school monogram.
- Vest: Cardinal red V necked vest with school monogram.
- Jacket: JHC Black Jacket with school monogram (may be worn in class).
- Hat: Plain black or school monogrammed bucket hat.
- Uniform for Travelling Team dress uniform with blazer

PE Uniform

- Plain black shorts or black track pants.
- Sports top T-shirt, red and gold. White polyprop may be worn underneath in winter. Gym shoes with white soles (no skate shoes, soft soles without laces or soft sandshoes). White or black short socks.
- Optional black warm-up hoodie with school logo on front and surname on back, worn with PE uniform only.
- PE uniform may be worn to and from school on Fridays (Junior Campus only).
- PE Top available for purchase from Junior or Senior Campus Office.
- Uniform for Travelling Team dress uniform with blazer

General

 Sandals: Optional in terms 1 and 4. Flat black, plain, with a heel strap and one ankle strap. Thong styles are not permitted. Socks are not to be worn with sandals. Sandals are not to be worn in laboratories and technology rooms. Sandals are not to be worn in Terms 2 and 3.

- Jacket: Any plain black weatherproof jacket (not cotton). The JHC black jacket with monogram is available online at https:// kooga.co.nz/james-hargest-college/
- Undergarment: A plain white or black t-shirt or polyprop may be worn under the uniform tops for extra warmth.
- Hat: Plain white hat or school monogrammed bucket hat for sun protection.
- Beanie: Optional. Cardinal red with gold stripe.
- Scarf: Optional. Cardinal red with gold stripe.
- Gloves: Optional. Black.
- Blazer: Regulation red with monogrammed pocket.

Personal Grooming

- Faces must be clean shaven.
- Students with longer hair must have it off the face and tied back with plain bands.
- Hair colour must be natural in appearance. Unnatural and/or multi-coloured hair is unacceptable. Extreme hairstyles are not acceptable (including shaven head, mohawks and tails).
- No jewellery is to be worn. The exception is one plain gold or silver stud in each earlobe.
- No make-up or nail varnish may be worn.

General Points

- All uniform items are to be worn correctly.
- All students using the workshops must wear protective clothing.
- Skirts must be of a reasonable length, neither very short nor very long.
- Parents are asked to be sure that uniform and footwear are in good order at the start of each term. All garments should be clearly marked with the owner's name.
- If in doubt regarding items of uniform, please check by ringing the school office before a purchase is made.

The PTA operates a scheme for the sale of second-hand uniforms. Sales are held at the end of the school year and towards the end of January. The sales will be advertised and in the school newsletter. If, for any reason, a student has to wear an item of non-regulation clothing to school, they must bring a note from parent/caregiver explaining the reason and bring this to the Associate Principal or Deputy Principals. Uniform items may be loaned in the short term.

Be on the lookout – we've got a plant causing strife in your neighbourhood.

Have you seen me in your 'hood?

Environment Southland is working to eradicate purple loosestrife, which we believe has escaped from a garden in your neighbourhood and made its way to stormwater drains and then into our waterways.

Purple loosestrife can cause blockages in drains, which may result in flooding and if it continues to reach local waterways it may destroy precious wetland habitats.

Its seeds are spread rapidly by wind, water, birds and in soil attached to cars and machinery.

REPORT IT!

If you think you've seen purple loosestrife please contact our biosecurity team immediately. Specialised control methods are required to manage this pest plant and will be carried out free of charge.

 Purple loosestrife has four to six-sided angular stems.

- Purple loosestrife is a garden plant growing 1-2m high.
- It has woody, four to six-sided angular stems and narrow pairs of leaves that are heart-shaped at the base. Purple loosestrife can be mistaken for the common toadflax (*Linaria purpurea*) but its angular stem and size differentiates it.
- From December to March purple loosestrife produces 20-25cm long spikes of pink/purple/magenta flowers.
- Black seed capsules grow 3-5mm long.
