



# Your Online Access to Teaching Staff at Hargest

The age of e-mail contact has had the effect of making teacher/parent and teacher/ student communication much easier, and, as a result, much more frequent! Generally this has been very positive for all of us.

Whilst staff accessibility is encouraged, we have recognised the need for some guidelines in order to allow staff to "switch off" after normal work hours. (Part of being a "Good Employer").

# **Guidelines/Expectations**

- We recognise that parents often send e-mails in evenings or weekends. (When they have time to attend to parenting issues!) However, staff are not expected to read or reply to e-mails after hours (ie during evenings, weekends or holidays).
- Staff response time will be variable according to their workload and teaching pressures. They are expected to acknowledge your email the next working day, and, where required, follow up with a more detailed response as soon as practicable (generally within two more days).
- Online accessibility of teachers by students follows the same guidelines, ie:
  - queries and questions may not be read or answered "after hours"
  - response times will vary
  - responses will be made as soon as practicable


This year we have 2 Year 7/8 teams and a Senior team playing on Saturdays.


Students who have access to computers revoked can have their passwords reinstated during the period of assessment. It is the responsibility of the students to inform their class teacher in advance.

# **Building and Construction Dog Kennels - FOR SALE!**

As part of our Year 12 Building and Construction Trade Course, students have been building dog kennels and we now have some for sale. The construction of the dog kennels has allowed us to teach our students the fundamentals of simple house building and roofing skills. The dog kennels were built as group projects allowing all students to be involved in the process. It has proven to be a very popular and successful course with many students having stepped from this course into industry-based training and apprenticeships.





Inside Dimensions Run

0.91m Wide by 1.185m Long by 1.03m High

Kennel (Sleeping area) which is insulated 735mm Wide by 625mm long by 750mm High





The kennels are well constructed using untreated macoracpa timber with untreated hardwood plywood to line the inside of the kennel. There is no nasty treated timber used for your beloved animals. The kennel and attached run are fully roofed allowing protection from the elements. The kennel itself is fully insulated in the walls, roof, and floor. There are two doors, one allowing access to the run and the other to the side of the kennel for cleaning and general access. The black corrugated roofing complete with matching flashings, and the rough sawn board and batten give a modern yet rustic look and feel to the kennel and would look great in any backyard. The dog kennels are suitable for dogs up to a labrador size.

Stand out results on day one included Ana McWilliam and Madison Stephens finishing 2nd in their u15 Double heat, Lilah Jack 3rd In the u16 Single, and Mia Brown and Ella Norman 2nd in the u17 Double. 14 Crews qualified for repechages on Saturday.

Day 2 of the Meridian SISS Championships was cut short by wind about half way through the repechages which shortened up the finals program for Sunday.

### Day 2 results:

Ella Norman finished 2nd and Lilah Jack 3rd to qualify for a B final in the u16 Single.


