

Curriculum Evaluation

All whānau will now have received the information letter about the planned next stage of our curriculum evaluation.

On Thursdays next term the Ōtatara bus will leave early, all other buses will depart at their scheduled time of 3.30. We will be running five 45 minute periods on this day, so all classes will still run and no one subject area will lose time each week.

Literacy and numeracy matters

As many parents know, the NCEA changes have brought with them a new co-requisite for literacy and numeracy. Students must pass these to gain any level of NCEA qualification. These are compulsory from this year.

Over the last two years, we have opted into the trials and used the data to inform some key changes to both our timetable, and the delibate teaching of the skills assessed through these tasks.

A big learning for all involved is that students may not pass on their first attempt, and this is not always an indication of their underlying skill level. Understanding the nature of the assessment and attention to detail also play a part and, as a result, the assessment is designed to be able to be attempted multiple times.

This year, the assessments are running in late May and September. A significant number of students in Year 10 and 11 will be entered for all three of these standards and teachers will work with students to ensure they know how to log on to the platform and understand the structure of the tasks they are being assessed on.

It is important to remember that the literacy and numeracy skills are embedded in courses from the time students start at James Hargest College in Year 7 and that it is only the nature of the tasks themselves that need explanation. Sample papers are available on the NCEA Education website (click here for reading, click here for writing, and click here for numeracy). Students may also do digital assessment practice through their NZQA logins.

Punctuality

An Important Key to Your Child's Success

Research shows that children with consistent school attendance learn more. If children are to fully benefit from the many learning opportunities, regular school attendance is vital. A student who is 10 minutes late every day will miss 30 hours of instruction during the year, definitely, a significant loss in the teachable moments that you can't get back.

Children who are late or absent can never recover what is most important: the discussion, the questions, the explanations by the teacher and the thinking that makes learning come alive.

While punctuality will promote learning, arriving late to school can also be very disruptive for the child, the teacher, and the other students in the class. There are a small portion of students who are regularly late and this is certainly affecting their ability to keep up with all set tasks.

A child's success in school depends on having a solid educational background, one that can only be gained through punctuality and regular school attendance. When

the child grows up, they will quickly learn that employers seek reliable, dependable and responsible people to fill employment positions. Regular attendance at school is also important in promoting social development. Developing positive attendance and timekeeping habits at a young age will serve the child well throughout their life.

What can you do to help your child to be punctual every day?

Make sure your child stays healthy by eating nutritious food and getting enough exercise. Maintain a regular bedtime to ensure that your child gets a good night's sleep, wakes up rested the next morning and has enough time to prepare for school. Make being at school on time a priority for your family. You can never get the time back that has been missed.

Research shows that attendance is the single most important factor in school success.



Recently our akonga had the opportunity to vote for the students to represent them on the Student Council. The purpose of the Student Council is to provide our learners with a voice regarding school activities, culture and events. The Student Council is split into two, with one being for Juniors and the other for Seniors. Each division of the Council serves different purpose, with an overarching goal to provide the greatest opportunity for students to feel

involved, engaged and listened to at Hēmi Hākena. This year the students on the Council were nominated by their peers in Form Time, with those who expressed an interest being interviewed for the position. So far the Council has been busy establishing their roles and brainstorming new initiatives and ideas that they would like to see implemented at Hēmi Hākena. Congratulations to our Student Council members. You are doing great things!

House Day 2024 was big, bright and beautiful. Thanks to our Heads of House, House Captains and Peer Support leaders for all of their mahi. The activities were so much







Stebsweb

Junior Campus

The Junior Campus have been trialling the online reading programme Stepsweb across all homerooms for Term One. It will become one of the tools that we use to support Literacy learning, for those who require extra support, throughout the rest of the year.

Research shows the need for a structured literacy approach – particularly with struggling learners and Stepsweb is a research-based, easy-to-use online structured literacy program. It covers key aspects of literacy and language development and covers the processing skills involved in literacy as well as the 'knowledge' aspects to foster literacy success. It has proven to be very effective!

The five big ideas in reading are as follows and Stepsweb targets all five.



When students begin using Stepsweb, they initially undergo a placement test which is analysed, then they are automatically placed at the appropriate level for their knowledge and skill set. From there, they undertake an individualised, structured literacy course. It will continually analyse the learner's errors and create reinforcement where required throughout the course.

Classroom teachers monitor students' usage and results on Stepsweb. They use the program to support their classroom teaching to ensure students have the best opportunity of developing their knowledge and skills in order to increase success in literacy.

Stepsweb is most effective when students engage with it regularly!
