### **Poppies, Poems and Planes** French trip April 2024

During our visit to Le Quesnoy in Northern France, we were privileged to be included in the Poppies, Poems and Planes project.

This project brings together students from around the globe to create poems from keywords with the theme of war. Together these poems are written on biodegradable paper which has poppy, cornflower and forget-me-not flower seeds embedded within. These three flowers represent the British, French and German soldiers who fought during the Great War. Our poem, Inspiration, was a collective effort with our New Zealand students and their hosts from Le Quesnoy, France. These poems will be dropped from a plane over significant battlefields, and out of the poems will grow flowers of remembrance. What a powerful way to remember the sacrifices made for our freedom!

### New Zealand Secondary Schools' Brass Band Competiton



A huge congratulations to Daniel Saunders (Year 13) and Hannah Wilson (Year 12) who have been selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Brass Band for 2024. Daniel has been selected for the main band as Solo Tenor Horn and Hannah as a percussionist for the development band. This year's NSSBB course will take place in Nelson in October.

Starting in 2001 the National Secondary Schools' Brass Band is an annual training course for brass and percussion musicians who attend New Zealand secondary schools. Players are selected for the band annually by audition. During the training course, players rehearsal as a full brass as well as dividing into sectionals where they are mentored and trained by champion adult players. The Band then performs concerts in the local community to not only entertain but to put their improved performance skills to the test. The players then give back to their community bands and schools by sharing the knowledge and experience they have gained.

Departments have looked at what we currently do, looked at what is working, looked at where we could do better and made some plans around new courses that can help engage our learners and make them greater participants in their own education. The dedicated time together is not something that happens easily in a school setting and we know it has at times had challenges for learners and their whānau. We are very grateful for your support.

### ShowQuest JUNIOR CAMPUS

On Tuesday the 25th of June, James Hargest Junior Campus headed to the **Civic Theatre for a day of Showquest** fun! We had worked on creating our performance, Opportunity Overload, over the course of Term 2 with the help of Senior Campus choreographers Katelyn Street-Wilson, Charlotte Blair, Anahera Unahi and Kayla Harding. Our story focused on a student making the most of every opportunity that school can provide - excelling and enjoying academic, cultural and sporting endeavours. Unfortunately, his worries were also along for the ride and began to overwhelm him as he raced from one opportunity to the next. This is a significant undertaking and we appreciate the support we have been given to enable this massive mahi to take place.

We look forward to sharing the outcomes of the mahi from this term and start the next steps of the evaluation process. Every year, nearly a million Cambridge learners sit Cambridge exams and earn international qualifications. The evolving nicotine landscape requires parents and caregivers to stay informed to protect young people from these emerging threats. Researchers highlight the detrimental effects of nicotine on developing brains, linking its use to depression, anxiety, ADHD symptoms, and an increased risk of addiction to other drugs.

The marketing of snus and nicotine pouches targets young audiences through social media influencers, raising concerns about their increasing popularity among school students. And like vapes, they come in various flavours and strengths, with unregulated nicotine levels leading to inconsistent and misleading labelling. It is clear that SLT products contain not only nicotine, but also other chemicals with unknown longterm effects.



### **Dan Davin Poetry Workshop**









On Friday June 7, twenty-one students volunteered to attend a poetry-writing workshop in the library. The workshop was run by Sara Hirsch, a poet from London. Sara is a UK Poetry Slam Champion, and also won the European Slam in Madrid. She regularly performs and teaches poetry around the world, and has published two books of her work.

Sara performed some of her poems, then took the students through a variety of exercises where they wrote and performed their own poetry. The workshop was interactive, fun, and ran for two hours.

One teacher thanked Sara as she was leaving, saying that her students had come back from the workshop buzzing. "That was so much fun. It was really, really cool!" said Alicia Purdon of Year 10.

Lots of students wanted to go, and in the end we had to turn some away. The workshop was part of a poetry festival run by the Dan Davin Literary Foundation, featuring events spread through four days all over Gore and Invercargill

### The Big Sing



Well done to Hēmi Hākena Senior Campus Choir Ancora for being selected for the Big Sing Cadenza. This places Ancora in the top 14 choirs in the South Island.

The 42-member SAB choir will travel to Timaru in August to complete in Cadenza. Cadenza combines the excitement of a competitive, Finale-style event with the extra dimension of massed workshops, featuring an internationally-recognised choral specialist who also acts as adjudicator. The two-day event, culminates in a public gala concert where all choirs at the festival showcase an item from their Cadenza repertoire and sing together music prepared with the adjudicator.

The Big Sing is a regional secondary school choral festival that takes place in 10 centres involving around 8,000 students from over 200+ schools, supported by their families and communities. The Big Sing has been taking place for over 30 years and is New Zealand's largest choral event with singers entering regional competitions held in Auckland, Waikato/Bay of Plenty, East Coast, Taranaki, Manawatu/Whanganui, Wellington, Marlborough/Nelson, Canterbury/West Coast, Otago and Southland.

Of the 200+ competing choirs, 60 are selected for the area Cadenza festivals (held in the Upper North Island, Lower North Island and South Island) and National Finale.


