Kia ora e te whānau,

Our students have quickly got back into positive learning habits as we start the new term, which is a short one being 9 weeks. Coming up soon are the Literacy and Numeracy CAA's (Common Assessment Activities) for a number of our Year 10 and 11 students. Students are encouraged to use the practice material provided on the NZQA site. There is futher information on these assessments,

as well as how to access resources to support preparation further in this newsletter.

This week approximately 100 Year 13 students visited Dunedin for the annual Tertiary Open Day, where they experience lectures at both the University and Polytech, visit halls of residence and generally orientate themselves a little with campus life. Whilst a number of students do know the direction they are going post school, it is very common for students to be a bit unsure or have no idea at all. This can be a stressful time for senior students especially if they have a perception that parents and teachers expect them to have things planned out. My advice to students in this category is to not spend time worrying but to focus on their studies and qualifications, to keep as many doors open as possible. Our Careers Department and Senior Deans are a valuable resource for students to seek advice about potential career and further study options.

Last week on both campuses, assemblies were held as part of our ANZAC Day remembrance. ANZAC Day takes on extra significance for our kura as we reflect on our namesake Brigadier James Hargest

and his deeds across both World War 1 and 2. Like so many others, Hargest gave the ultimate sacrifice of his life in battle. We make no attempt to glorify war but instead seek to pay our respects to the men and women who served on foreign soil.

Our building project is well underway and we have some photos in this newsletter for you to see. We are excited to see the progress after many years of uncertainty. All going well, our students will be learning in this building this time next year.

As the winter sporting season begins I would like to thank all of our community volunteers. We still have some teams that are needing some adult supervision (not necessarily coaching). If you are able to assist in any way please contact the sports office.



In 2016 Richard James arrived at JHC to take up the the Head of Junior English position. He arrived in his RM Williams boots, his bulging briefcase in hand. Cashmere High were sad to let a man of Richard's immense ability leave their school where he was a long-standing and noted Head of Media Studies. Their loss was our gain.

An advocate for the art of the written word, Richard has entered many writing competitions showing his students that learning doesn't stop when the

classroom door closes. Creativity is a lifelong journey, and as Richard enters retirement, he will finally have the time and opportunity to expand on his own published works. (For anyone who wasn't aware, Richard has written a novel and many short stories and we are very keen to see more and more of his written work published during his retirement.)

This love of writing can be seen in the impact Richard has had on students in his classes and through Interrobang, as Amanda Henderson (Interrobang's Editor) has recorded:

"I don't think Mr James fully realises the profound impact he's had on the editors he's worked with over the years. Interrobang has always been more than a magazine—it's been his labour of love. His encouragement, his sharp eye, and the way he always greeted us with a smile made the meetings a joy. We'd often chat about school life, laugh about his latest Year 9 class, and share excitement over the amazing student writing being submitted. He was always pushing and asking for more and more, and being given incredible pieces of writing as a result.'

As the demands of a changing curriculum grew, Richard increased his output. Vocabulary evolved - learning intentions, moderation, exemplars, and double marking. The classroom walls were vibrant - exemplars of student work providing inspiration and next steps for both his students and for staff to consider when popping in for a two minute conversation. This is just a small example of his generosity, his willingness to give of his time.



Literacy & Numeracy Corequisite Assessment Tasks

In Week 4 of this term, from May 19th to May 23th, Y10 students and some students in Y11, Y12 and Y13 will have the opportunity to sit the Literacy and Numeracy Corequisite Assessments.

These three assessments enable students to gain the Literacy & Numeracy credits that are required attain an NCEA qualification. If a student is unsuccessful or absent, there will be another opportunity at the end of Term 3 of this year. Failing that, students will be able to continue sitting these assessments until they are successful.

Over the last few weeks students have been preparing for these assessments. They have been asked to ensure that their device is able to access the website and the past sample digital papers and to ensure that their device is fully charged each day. The battery will need to be able to last for at least two hours at a time. If their device does not have the necessary specifications, they will be able to borrow a school

device. Students should let their form teacher know and one will be booked for them. It is unlikely that a device will be able to be borrowed on the day without prior booking. For students who use SAC conditions, appropriate assistance is being organised.

Students have a minimum of 60 minutes to complete each assessment. However, if a student needs extra time, it is available to them. Students cannot leave the assessment in the first hour, but will be able to return to class at the end of the lesson or when they get finished in the second hour. They will need to be prepared for this.

See below for days and period times for each assessment session. Students should be aware that sessions start at slightly different times each day due to the school timetable. All assessment sessions will take place in the Hall. Students should be outside the Hall at least 5 minutes before the start of the assessment.

She's pictured at her final health check before her journey back to her original ngāhere (forest), with kiwi keeper, Anna.







Things are getting exciting with our new Science and Student Support block. Lots of earth has been shifted and now we are beginning to lay the foundations for future learning.








Our Performance Studio (Studio One) is getting closer to completion. The floor has been laid and things are starting to take shape.

BRIGADIER'S DIPLOMA

The Brigadier's Diploma provides a framework for assessing students in Year 11 that maintains and protects academic rigour, while incorporating wider holistic educational goals. Academic performance is the foundation of the award but students are also judged on their Hargest Way grades for effort and respect and are expected to maintain excellent attendance. The Diploma can also be endorsed with Sport, Culture and Āwhina (or service) depending on their wider contribution.

Attendance at Hēmi Hākena

High attendance rates across our kura are a source of pride. In order to retain (and increase) these rates we continue to work hard, together as a community, to ensure our rangatahi are at school, in their classes. We know this has a high contribution to success in education. This will positively impact their future.

Some of the common attendance codes you might see on your child's attendance and what they stand for are:

P - Present

L - Late

U - Unjustified Absence

J - Justified absence

Justified and Unjustified absences can be confusing. To be marked as a Justified Absence our kura works to a set of rules to ensure transparency, consistency, and fairness to all. A Justified Absence is granted for:

- A day to attend a tangi / funeral
- Competing in approved sporting or cultural events / tournaments
- · A day for a family wedding
- Dance, music or speech exam

Unjustified Absences are the likes of:

- A family holiday
- A non-specific appointment
- Taking a pet to the vet
- Job Interview

First and foremost, attendance queries should be addressed to your child's form teacher. They are monitoring the days rangatahi are absent and looking for any patterns in this. Deans are also a great support and are monitoring the individual periods absent within a day where students are otherwise present, and are especially monitoring where attendance rates begin to fall.

If you know your child is going to be absent in advance, on a family holiday for instance, please email, our Attendance Officer, Lisa Martin, who will action the paperwork for the student to get signed off by their teachers. It is important for Year 12 - 13 students to carefully examine the impact of such absences on their NZQA assessments. We especially encourage students to check the flowchart for absence from a test or absence for an assessment deadline. Year 11 students should be aware of the impact unjustified absences will have on levels of achievement for their Brigadier's Diploma for which we know most have set high goals.



He iti te mokoroa, nāna i kati te kahikatea The mokoroa (grub) may be small, but it cuts


through the Kahikatea.

Pre RYDA Workshop Discoveries

On Monday 12 May, all Year 12 students will attend the RYDA road safety workshop. During the workshop you'll be discussing a number of topics and finding strategies that will help keep you and your friends, safe. Come to the workshop prepared to discuss your experiences.

OPTION

MIND-STATE

Practice a grounding exercise designed to relieve anxiety and help you stay in the moment: Close your eyes and slowly take 3 deep breaths. Open your eyes and identify and name the following: 5 things you see; 4 things you feel; 3 things you hear; 2 things you smell; 1 thing you taste. After you've completed the exercise, take a moment and then record your findings (ie, impact on focus, mood, etc).

OPTION 2

DISTRACTIONS

Have a look in your family car and see how many potential distractions you can identify. Find and comment on one distraction that you think can be removed, and one distraction that can't be removed but can be managed.

OPTION 3

SAFER ROADS

Research a local road or one that you regularly drive on (say, for family holidays) that has undergone an upgrade. Jot down the improvements that were made, research why they were made and bring the information along to the RYDA workshop.

OPTION 4

SAFER VEHICLES

Research the kind of car you might buy as your first car. Start by setting your budget and looking at your options (eg, new or second hand/ 'must have' features). Once you have decided on your car run a search and write down the safety features it comes with. Bring your list along to the RYDA day and compare with the safety features discussed.

OPTION 5

SAFER SPEEDS

Do an online search to find a comprehensive definition of speeding as it relates to driving and determine the percentage of road crashes, in this country, where speeding is found to be a direct factor in fatality crashes.



VULNERABLE ROAD USERS

Create and conduct an online survey of vulnerable road users (pedestrians, cyclists, motorbike bike riders, roadworkers, etc). Analyse the behaviour (positive and negative) of these road users and, from their perspective, the behaviour (positive and negative) of vehicle drivers as they interact with them. Identify the three most reported negative/dangerous behaviours for each of the two road user groups and bring your findings to the RYDA workshop.

ANZAC Day Parade





"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. We will remember them."











