Whānau Report

In the build up, we performed for whānau and for the Hēmi Hākena Teina Kapa Haka roopu. To see the links and bonds between the two groups was humbling and very powerful. Kapa Haka is a more than a performance, it is a way of celebrating identity and

making connections. It is about being part of something that has gone before, and lighting the way for those who will come afterwards. Matariki performances have happened this term too! The word Matariki has two parts in Te Reo Māori: Mata" – meaning eyes and Ariki" – meaning chief, so together, Matariki is often translated as "the eyes of the chief." Matariki is often understood through three main themes:

Remembrance – Honouring those we have lost - Matariki begins with a time of mourning, where families remember loved ones who have passed during the year. It is a chance to speak their names, share stories, and acknowledge their lives in a collective space of aroha. Celebration – Giving thanks for the present - After remembrance comes celebration — a time to share kai, enjoy music and dance, and spend time with whānau and friends. It's a joyful moment of gratitude for life, health, and community.

Aspiration – Looking ahead with hope -The final theme focuses on the future. People make wishes, set goals, and plant seeds for the coming year — both literally and metaphorically. Rangatahi especially are encouraged to think about their dreams, their role in caring for the world, and the kind of future they want to create.

Matariki themes encourage us to stop, pause and think about what is important. These are important messages for us all.

James Hargest College - Board of Trustee Election 2025

Every three years all public schools in Aotearoa hold elections for their School Boards, and this is going to happen again in 2025.

The School Board is a key part of our school because they do a lot of important things behind the scenes that while they may not be visible, are really important to keeping our school running. Our board is made up of five parent vacancies, the Principal, a staff rep elected by the staff and a student rep elected by the students (in Year 9 to 13).

The board need to appoint a Returning Officer, who is responsible for the

running of the 2025 election and we have appointed Election Pilot so our election can be provided online. They have been assisting schools with elections for over 20 years and have been accredited by the Ministry of Education to provide online election services. Important things like the nomination and voting forms will be sent to you by email directly by Election Pilot. If we don't have an email address for you, Schooled Election Pilot will send these out to you by post.

Your name and contact details have been provided to Election Pilot to enable them to deliver election services for our school as required by legislation. They will use your contact details for the provision of election services for James Hargest College only and your details will be deleted 60 days after the election date as required by legislation.

We will continue to keep you updated through the various stages of the election process, and our election date is the 10th September 2025.

Reporting at JHC

Senior Campus

This week you will be receiving your child's assessment summary report. This report will contain grades they have earned across their subjects in the first half this year, as well as a reflection from your child and their teacher. The purpose of this report is to consolidate all of the grades you have received in real time through live reporting into one document to help you see patterns or trends. Please take the time to go through this report with your child and make contact with your child's classroom teacher if you have any queries.

We also have some standardised assessments in the report for students in year 7-10. These are results earned in a single, timed assessment event. These results should be read in conjunction with the results in classes which generally show what students can achieve over a longer period of time, and often with feedback and support from their teacher. Learning to perform to the best of their ability under test conditions is something that becomes very important when preparing for the NCEA **Common Assessment** Activities, and hence we have started reporting on these assessments to give you and your child an indicator of their readiness for these assessments.

The Value of Reading

What is it that successful students do? Something that is a common denominator for success in schools is the ability to read broadly and deeply. Reading gives our students an opportunity to learn anything. It allows for freedom of thought, and it can instil curiosity in the world. As a proud educational institution our focus is helping students to enjoy their learning experience so that they leave our gates as pursuers of lifelong learning. Continuous reading allows for continuous education.

A key gift a parents can give to their child's schooling is the ability to develop reading habits and instil the notion of reading for pleasure. OECD research shows that reading for pleasure is a more important influence than socio-economic background and that children who read for pleasure have a one-and-ahalf-year advantage over their peers.

Some advocates for reading will suggest that it does not matter what students read as long as they are reading and enjoying the process. This statement is true to a point. Quality literature is critical as it develops sustained thinking and expands cultural and social awareness. Reading is a gift. It is the difference between the educated and the uneducated and, as Mark Twain stated, "The man who does not read has no advantage over the man who cannot read." Parents who encourage good reading habits at home support students in all areas of the curriculum.

Reflecting on History: H9JWN's September 11 Murals

This term in Social Studies, H9JWN has been exploring how the ideas and actions of people in the past have significantly impacted lives. We focused on the September 11 attacks, a pivotal event that reshaped global perspectives and had profound consequences on the world.

To help us understand the immediate impact and lasting significance, one of our activities involved creating powerful collages. Students used newspaper front pages and headlines from the day of the attacks, transforming them into symbolic images that captured the weight and emotion of that moment. This hands-on project allowed students to connect with history in a unique and meaningful way.

I chose to create an eye because on the day of 9/11 there were so many eyes watching the twin tower collapsing. In the corner of the eye I chose to create a tear signifying how sad 9/11 was for the whole world. SSR/SSW Sustained Silent Reading/Writing

Imagine there was a new treatment that would rewire your brain. It would provide an improved attention span and memory, and a better understanding of complex and abstract ideas. It would improve sleep quality and mood, and reduce anxiety. It would even make you more empathetic and understanding of other's lives. It would be a miracle treatment, right? In our busy, everchanging and increasingly stressed and anxious world, who would not want all those things for themselves and their children.

Strong research findings show that reading does all those things. However, it is a 20-minute treatment. It takes 20 minutes of reading on a regular basis for your brain to start developing those new, more efficient neural pathways that help to provide many of those benefits.

We are concerned by the number of students who believe that they cannot sit and read for 20 minutes. They tell us that they do not have the attention span. At JHC Senior Campus Monday - Thursday after lunch is SSR or SSW. The point is to build reading or writing mileage and make it a regular part of the day. We ask whānau to support us in this endeavour. Talk to students about what they are reading or writing. Encourage them to read at home. We have fantastic library facilities at both campuses and awesome librarians who can help students find books they will enjoy. Reach out if you need support with this. We are happy to help.



Reminders from the Senior Campus Attendance Office



Digital Technologies Junior Campus




