Kia ora koutou,

The May meeting of the JHC Board of Trustees opened with karakia and then Jonny Horrax, HoD Social Sciences spoke to the Board about the 2024 report for the subject areas he has responsibility for. Jonny shared with us the Department's excitement about being part of Te Pōhā Matauraka o Murihiku which is a robust program of learning designed to connect schools to local iwi. Jonny spoke about the ways the Department is working collaboratively to align the learning from Years 7 - 10 and the greater confidence staff have in sharing these awesome resources and localised perspectives. He also shared the growing excitement around the Year 9 curriculum refresh that is happening this term. The new courses being designed in the social sciences are student centered and future focussed. They will give a lot more student choice and the ability to be partners in their learning to a far greater level. The Brigadier's Diploma at Year 11 has also been a real success in social sciences with students taking ownership of their learning and achievement. Finally, the other highlight was in Scholarship success. The Social Sciences area earned four NZ Scholarships last year, two in Classics, one in History and an Outstanding Scholarship Award in Media Studies. These Scholarships are only achieved with significant time invested from the teachers involved. These are a testament to the teachers dedication and willingness to support students to achieve at the highest level. The Board is very grateful for the hard work of Jonny and his team and we certainly appreciated hearing about all the wonderful things happening in that area.

On the property front it was great to see some pictorial updates on the new build. It is exciting to see this moving forward and to know that it will be a fabulous asset for our kura for years to come. That it is completely out of the way and does not impact teaching and learning of other spaces is also a great result and a testament to the hard work and planning form Al Pannet. We continue to be grateful for his careful and thoughtful oversight of all aspects of the property at JHC.

Our student representative, Ben Hargest spoke to the board about all the events happening around school and gave a student perspective on what is making a difference for students. As always, we appreciate his insight and involvement in so many areas of the school.



Larisa Mckenna



Summary of Reporting Review (May 2025)

At James Hargest College we value open and honest communication with you regarding your ākonga/young person's progress and achievement and an important part of this communication is our written reports.

Our Teaching and Learning Committee are currently reviewing our written mid and end of year reports and sought feedback from parents/ whānau / caregivers through a survey earlier in the term. A summary of the feedback provided is included below and this valuable information will be used to inform the update of our written report formats and processes over the next 6 months.

Are our reports easy to understand and what information is not included that you would appreciate?



Overall whānau find our reports clear (46%) to relatively clear (33%) to interpret and understand. Assessment grades are highly valued with 92% of respondents indicating these are of importance in reporting, followed by Homeroom or Form Teacher Comments (86%) and approximately 60% of respondents also valued the summary of Live Reporting, Attendance, Student Comments and the table which demonstrates NCEA progress. While comprehensive mid and end-of-year reports are valued, many also appreciate the regular, timely updates sent via our Live Reporting.

Feedback provided did indicate that some parents find some of our current grading systems and subject-specific language confusing, preferring reports that are easy to understand and provide a clear sense of whether their child is on track academically relative to their peers and national standards.

A consistent theme across all year levels was the need for reports to offer a "holistic view" of their child as a learner, detailing their learning dispositions, such as confidence, participation, and work ethic. Parents would like more personalised information and written comments from subject teachers that provide insights into the young person's struggles, successes, classroom interactions, and areas needing support, indicating a preference for reports that show teachers truly know their child's "learning journey"




We would like to congratulate Kelly Nicolson who has been appointed to the Literacy Support team. Kelly will continue in her Teacher Aide position also.

Does your ākonga / young person's report tell you what their next steps in learning are?



It is clear from your feedback that a next step for us as a school is to ensure feedback in reports provides actionable next steps, which are understandable to parents and placed within the context of typical achievement, that parents can use in supporting their child's academic progress at home. This is particularly important at mid year, so this can be actioned before exams and end of year assessments.

Is the attendance data relevant and/or useful in reports?



57.8% of respondents find attendance data included in reports useful, but would prefer attendance percentages included for every subject. Feedback also indicates that whānau would prefer attendance data to indicate whether absences are justified or not, for example out of class for sporting events.

We will continue to refine the way we report to whanau using your feedback. We are grateful to those of you who took the time to respond.






Junior Campus

Soaking in the South: Students Discover the Charms of Stewart Island



The ferry churned through the Foveaux Strait, a brisk wind whipping at the faces of the excited group of students peering out at the approaching silhouette of Stewart Island. The rugged beauty of Rakiura was finally unfolding before their eyes, promising an unforgettable immersion into nature and a taste of island life.

Their adventure began with a combined Village and Bay Tour, a perfect introduction to the island's unique character. A local guide, whose deep connection to Stewart Island was evident in every anecdote and observation, steered them through the tranquil waters of Paterson Inlet. The students were captivated by the sheltered bays, fringed by native bush that tumbled down to meet the turquoise sea. They learned about the early Māori history of the island, the sealing and whaling eras, and the more recent development of tourism. The guide pointed out hidden coves and shared stories of the island's resilient community, painting a vivid picture of life in this remote corner of New Zealand.



Disembarking in Oban, the island's only settlement, the students were immediately struck by its laid-back atmosphere. Colourful houses dotted the hillside, overlooking the bustling (by Stewart Island standards) harbour. Their next stop was the Rakiura Museum, a treasure trove of artifacts and stories that brought the island's past to life. They examined old photographs of hardy pioneers, marvelled at tools used by early Māori, and gained a deeper understanding of the island's rich maritime heritage. The museum visit provided a valuable context for the landscape they were experiencing, connecting the stunning natural beauty with the human stories woven into its fabric.

With a newfound appreciation for the island's history, the students spent the afternoon exploring Oban at their own pace. They wandered along the waterfront, watching fishing boats bob gently in the harbour. Some ventured into the small shops, browsing local crafts and souvenirs, while others enjoyed a well-deserved ice cream, soaking in the peaceful ambiance. The friendly locals greeted them with warm smiles, reinforcing the sense of community that defines Stewart Island.

As the day drew to a close, the students gathered, sharing their impressions of the island. The pristine beauty of the bays, the fascinating stories unearthed at the museum, and the welcoming spirit of Oban had all left a lasting mark. This wasn't just a sightseeing trip; it was an opportunity to connect with a unique environment and a resilient community, a chance to learn about the past and appreciate the present. As the ferry prepared for its return journey, the students carried with them not just photographs and souvenirs, but a deeper understanding and a newfound appreciation for the captivating charm of Stewart Island. Their adventure in the South had just begun, leaving them eager to explore more of Rakiura's wild and wonderful secrets.


