

Whānau Report

Kia ora koutou.

At Hēmi Hākena, karakia are an important part of tikanga. They are used in many different contexts, and both formal and informal situations.

The purpose of karakia t matanga is to open or start something - for example; a lesson, a meeting, a wānanga, or the day. The intent of having karakia is to bring everyone together and focus their minds on the kaupapa ahead, with the hope that everything flows smoothly and well. When looking at the translations of these karakia, please note that sometimes English words cannot fully encapsulate the essence of the kupu Māori - therefore literal translations should be considered metaphorically. The karakia tīmatanga we usually use is:

Tūtawa mai i runga

Tūtawa mai i raro Tūtawa mai i roto Tūtawa mai i waho Kia tau ai te mauri tū, te mauri ora ki te katoa Haumi e, hui e, tāiki e

We bring in all that is good from above (Ranginui), from below (Papatūānuku), from within, from without, to settle us for the work ahead, we proceed...

Karakia is not just a ritual, for Māori it's a practice of hauora, of reconnecting to wairua, whenua, and whakapapa. It creates stillness before action, clears pathways, and grounds us in who we are. Karakia reminds us we are never separate, our breath, our words, our Tipuna are with us in every step.

As we finish the year strongly with celebrations and whānau, it is important to remember what really matters, He iti tangata e tupu – he iti toki e iti tonu. Meri Kirihimete, ngā mihi o te wā.



depth of knowledge, calm presence, and commitment to helping students thrive have left a lasting mark.



Food and Nutrition is a very popular subject at JHC. We wish for this to continue for years to come.





Change is a natural part of growing up. Whether it's the start of a new school year, moving between year levels, or stepping beyond the school gates for the final time, each transition brings a mix of emotions, presenting both opportunities and challenges. These shifts call on young people to adjust to new routines, navigate unfamiliar environments and develop emotional flexibility. Research shows that periods of transition are often linked to heightened anxiety, reduced academic engagement and changes in peer relationships. For families, these periods can also bring added stress. Recognising the emotional and psychological impact of change helps us respond more effectively and supportively.

While change can feel daunting, it also offers valuable opportunities for young people to learn and grow. By normalising uncertainty and encouraging open conversations, we help young people face new beginnings with curiosity rather than fear. When children are surrounded by guidance, encouragement and consistent structure, they're far better equipped to manage life's transitions with confidence and resilience.
