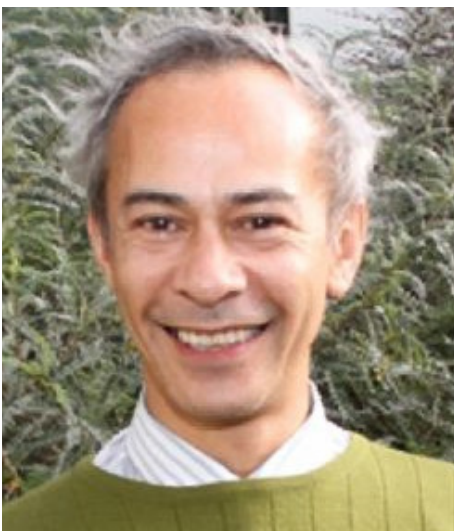

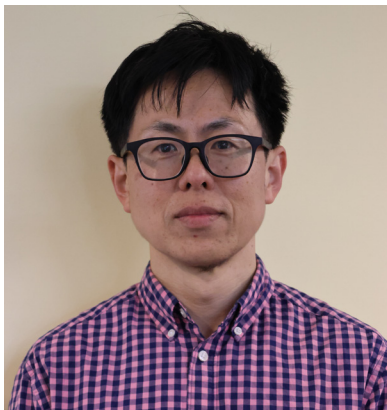
A hard working and solutions focused leader, Erin approaches challenges

ANZAC Day

We gathered together as a school and as a community, to honour a promise made over a century ago. In New Zealand, and especially at James Hargest College, we stand in the long shadow of the ANZAC legacy; a story of courage, of deep loss, and of a spirit that defines us.

For us at this College, that legacy isn't just a chapter in a history book; it's the very name on our gates and the crest on our blazers. Brigadier James Hargest was more than a military leader; he was a practical Southland farmer, a husband, and a father. Before the medals and the rank, he was a man who loved the Southland soil. A farmer who expected to grow old in the place we call home.

His journey embodies the very essence of the ANZAC spirit. He was there at the Gallipoli landings in 1915, where he was seriously wounded. He did not falter, returning to command troops on the Western Front. When the world called again in 1939, he chose to lead the 5th Infantry Brigade through the harrowing campaigns of Greece, Crete, and North Africa.

Brigadier James Hargest never returned to his Southland farm; he was killed in

Normandy in 1944. His death was a loss felt by the whole nation, but most keenly by his family, who had already lost his son, Geoffrey, at the Battle of Monte Cassino just months earlier. Geoffrey was just 22 years old.

It is easy to think of these people as distant historical figures, but they were young New Zealanders just like our students today. The soldiers in the trenches, the nurses in field hospitals, and the sailors on the ships were often only 18 or 19. They left their homes and schools to face a reality that was far from the "great adventure" many expected.

ANZAC Day gives us pause to look around at our lives, our ability to speak our minds, to learn in peace, and to live in a free society. Our freedom wasn't a gift; it was a hard-won inheritance. These things were protected by the bravery of young people who stood their ground when everything was at stake. We owe them an immense debt of gratitude. Our way of life is the living legacy of their sacrifice.

We remember them.

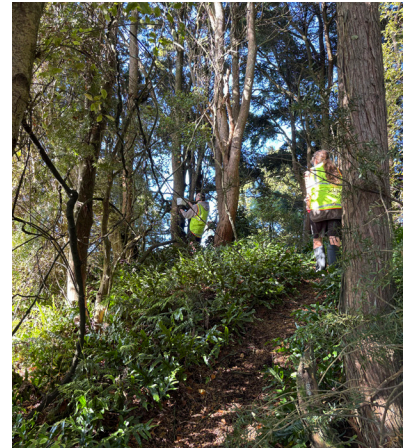

Environmental Camp

12 of our students recently returned from our annual Environmental Leadership Camp at Te Kōawa Lodge in Blackmount. This marks the second year of this impactful programme, and once again, our students returned with a deeper appreciation for our local ecosystem and a renewed sense of responsibility as kaitiaki.

The camp provided a blend of education and practical conservation work. The students were fully immersed in the outdoors, engaging in a range of valuable activities including a stream study, using tracker tunnels and cameras to monitor pests, and rolling up their sleeves to perform essential maintenance on the mahinga kai planting site.

Looking Ahead to Term 3, the students have already begun brainstorming and planning an exciting community project, which they are eager to execute during Term 3.



Literacy & Numeracy Corequisite Assessment Tasks

In Week 5 of this term, from May 18th to May 22nd, Y10 students and some Y11, Y12 and Y13 students will have the opportunity to sit the Literacy (Reading and Writing) and Numeracy Corequisite Assessments.

These three assessments enable students to gain the Literacy & Numeracy credits that are required to attain an NCEA qualification. If a student is unsuccessful or absent, there will be another opportunity at the end of Term 3 of this year. Following that, students will be able to continue sitting these assessments until they are successful.

Over the last few weeks students have been preparing for these assessments. They have been asked to ensure that their device is able to access the website and the past sample digital papers and to ensure that their device is fully charged each day. The battery will need to be able

to last for at least two hours at a time. If their device does not have the necessary specifications, they will be able to borrow a school device. Students should let their form teacher know and one will be booked for them. It is unlikely that a device will be able to be borrowed on the day without prior booking. For students who have been granted SAC conditions, appropriate assistance is being organised. Additionally, the Numeracy and Writing assessments will have a text to speech function available to read out the questions. If students wish to use this feature, they will need to have their own headphones compatible with their device. Practice assessments are available on the NZQA site so that students can familiarise themselves with the tasks.

Students have a minimum of 60 minutes to complete each assessment. However, if a student needs extra time, it is available

to them. Students cannot leave the assessment in the first hour, but will be able to return to class at the end of the lesson or when they get finished in the second hour. They will need to be prepared for this.

See below for days and period times for each assessment session. Students should be aware that sessions start at slightly different times each day due to the school timetable. All assessment sessions will take place in the Hall. Students should be outside the Hall at least 5 minutes before the start of the assessment.

World Vision Conference

On Friday 24th April, six enthusiastic students traveled to Dunedin with Mr Redmond for the World Vision Youth Conference. The day was about leadership, advocacy and action. We were made aware of how other people are living, in particular in the Solomon Islands, and how we can spark action in our schools. We heard many different leaders speak, including the very impressive Lola Fisher, who, at the age of 14 co-founded Create Happy Media, a media outlet made for teens, by teens. She was very inspiring, as were the

stories of how people are working to help the one in six children who do not have enough food, and other families in extreme poverty around the world. Some are forced to eat only a few seeds a day to survive, or not eat at all.

We learned about how their main food in the Solomon Islands comes from fishing and farming, and how natural disasters are destroying crops. No crops means that they have to find alternative food sources, even though there are less and less fish. Families are separated as

parents go out to fish for days at a time, and come back with barely any at all. Sometimes they never come back. But they have no choice. Thousands of children have to walk for hours to get water, which isn't even clean - sometimes they have no water because the rain makes it too dirty and they get sick. Parents are doing their best, but we have an opportunity to make a difference by supporting World Vision. We will be leading the mahi at Hemi Hakena and can't wait to get started. 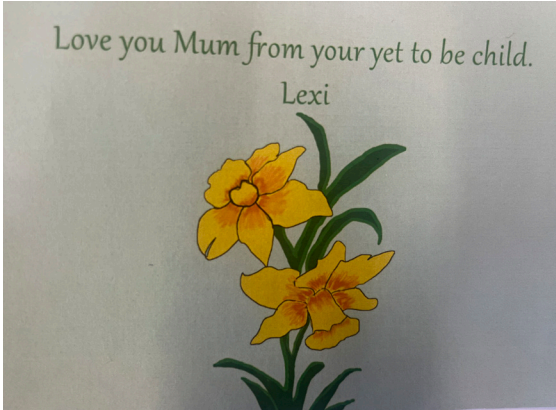
Deep Cove

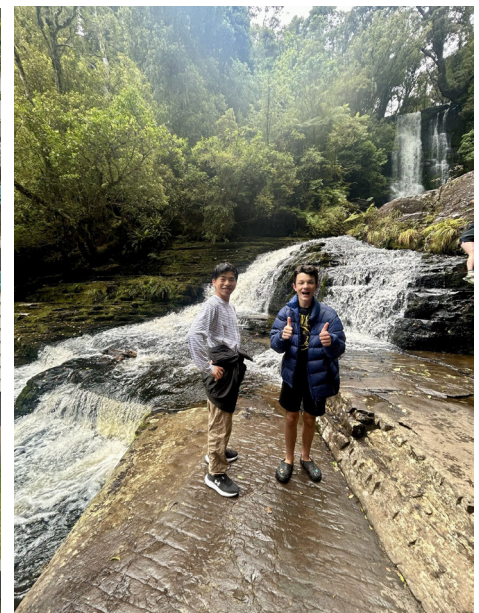
International Students

Spanish Adventure 2026

Twenty students and two teachers recently set off on an unforgettable Spanish adventure, immersing themselves in the language, culture, and vibrant life of Spain over four incredible weeks.

Our journey began in the lively city of Barcelona, where students explored the breathtaking masterpieces of Antoni Gaudí. Highlights included the awe-inspiring Sagrada Família, the colourful Casa Batlló, and the stunning hilltop views from Park Güell. Wandering through the narrow, winding streets of the Gothic Quarter added a sense of history and charm to our time in the city.

From there, we travelled to Madrid, where students took part in a city-wide scavenger hunt—an exciting way to discover landmarks and hidden gems. A definite highlight was rowing boats in El Retiro Park, soaking up the sunshine and enjoying one of Madrid’s most iconic experiences.

Next, we boarded a high-speed train to Córdoba before continuing by bus to Priego de Córdoba, where we spent three weeks living with local homestay families. This immersive experience allowed students to develop their

Spanish language skills while gaining a deeper understanding of daily life and culture. Attending school in Priego proved to be a rewarding experience (and a highlight for some!).

Our time in southern Spain included several memorable day trips. In Ronda, we explored what is often described as one of Spain’s prettiest towns, home to one of the oldest bullfighting rings. A visit to Granada and the breathtaking Alhambra was another unforgettable highlight, showcasing stunning architecture and rich history. Additional excursions took us to Zuheros, where we explored dramatic landscapes, bat caves, and even Roman ruins.

French Trip 2026

Two years rolls around pretty fast, and April saw another group of Senior French students take to the skies and wing their way to France for the French Exchange.

Once again, James Hargest combined with Southland Girls' High to provide this amazing opportunity to experience the French culture and language in its birthplace.

After landing and finding Ari, our wonderful coach driver, we drove to Le Quesnoy, a town in Northern France that was liberated by NZ soldiers at the end of the First World War. Le Quesnoy has a long history and connection with Aotearoa and while there we walked the ramparts and laid a wreath at the NZ memorial site. We also visited Te Arawhata NZ Liberation Museum and learned about the human impact of the town's occupation and of the soldiers involved in the conflict. Quite the day after a long journey!

We stayed three nights at the Peace Village in Mesen, Belgium, while we visited various places connected to the Western Front and WW1, including Tyne Cot Cemetery, Passchendaele, Ypres, and Polygon

Wood. Our group participated in the Last Post Ceremony at the Menen Gate Memorial where we laid another wreath on behalf of our two schools.

On our way back to Paris to get the train to Bourg-en-Bresse, we stopped at Arras to visit the Carrière Wellington, a network of tunnels dug out by NZ soldiers to gain a territorial advantage along the Western Front during WW1.

After our time in Belgium, we took the train to Bourg-en-Bresse to meet with our host students and spend some time in a French school. Most students got to experience what a full day at school in France means - an 8am start with lessons right through until 6pm - the consensus was that they prefer the NZ schooling system!

The New Zealand students stayed with their host families for the first week of their school holidays and visited various places within the region and beyond. We met back again as a group and travelled to Lausanne, Switzerland to experience another French-speaking country before finishing our trip with Paris.

Paris highlights included Disneyland, the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre, Notre-Dame Cathedral, travelling the metro, wandering the Parisian streets and soaking in the French joie de vivre. Sacré-Coeur Basilica, the Montmartre, Sainte Chapelle, dinner out at a traditional Parisian bistro restaurant and the Opéra Garnier were also on the itinerary. A full week of sightseeing and adventures!

It truly is a pleasure to take these groups away and all the students represented the school outstandingly. The lifelong memories they make, the friendships they forge, and seeing how the world opens up to them makes all the hard work worthwhile. Thank you to the JHC and SGHS Boards for their continued support of these opportunities for our students.

Brigadier James Hargest

CBE, DSO & TWO BARS, MC, VD, MP

1891 – 1944



The foyer photo of Brigadier James Hargest shows a calm, middle-aged leader preparing to serve in World War II at age 48. As commander of New Zealand's 5th Brigade, he led troops through difficult campaigns in Greece, Crete, and Libya, where Allied forces often faced setbacks but earned respect for their resilience.

Born in Gore in 1891, Hargest grew up in Southland and developed a passion for soldiering early. He served with distinction in World War I, fighting in major battles

such as Gallipoli and the Somme, and earned several high honours. After the war, he became a farmer near Invercargill, raised a family, and later entered politics as a Member of Parliament. In World War II, Hargest again volunteered for service. Captured in Libya in 1941 after a battle with German forces led by Erwin Rommel, he was held as a prisoner of war in Italy. He successfully escaped and made his way back to England in 1942. Refusing a safer role, he returned to active duty and was killed in France in 1944 by

a sudden shell burst. Hargest is remembered as a brave soldier, dedicated leader, and committed public servant. James Hargest Memorial High School, opened in 1958, honors his legacy, reflecting his values of courage, service, and faith.
